Sgt. W. John B. Bennett Reported Killed In Action

Had Been Transferred To R.C.A.F. From Grey & Simcoe Foresters

Our community was shocked to learn of the death of Johnnie Bennett, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. John Bennett of Markdale, who was killed during air operations over enemy territory.

Word of Sergt. Bennett's death, which occurred on Tuesday, Oct. 6. was received in a cablegram by his Details concerning his parents. death will be given in a letter to follow. This has been the first casualty from Markdale district.

Sergeant William John Bowles Bennett, who was 23 years of age, was born and raised on the Bennett farm, Highway No. 10, about a mile north of the village. He had attended S. S. No. 6, Holland Township, and later Markdale High School, completing his education with a commercial course.

In May of 1940 John Bennett enlisted with the Grey and Simcoe Foresters. Recently he transferred to the Royal Canadian Air Force, receiving his wings as an air gunner at Fingal in June. He arrived in Great Britain just two months igo and was stationed in Wales. Two older brothers Lance Corp. Stewart Bennett and Gnr. George Bennett are both serving with the Canadian Army in England. A letter received from a local soldier tells of meeting one of the Bennett boys quite recently and of them planning a reunion together. He is also survived by two sisters, Margaret, Mrs. Reginald Fee of Holland Centre and Miss Charlotte Bennett of Markdale.

Of a quiet disposition the young airman was held in high esteem by all who knew him. He was popular throughout the district and general egret is expressed in his untimely but honourable death.

Rotarians Hear Interesting Talk On Newfoundland

Newfoundland was the topic of Dr. Mercer's talk at the Rotary Club meeting on Tuesday evening. Dr. Mercer, a native of Newfoundland ered an inpiring sermon at the and now minister in the United Church at Maxwell, intimated that the truth about Newfoundland has not always been given. In an address of half an hour he endeavored to clear up some of the mistaken impressions of that country.

As a boy Dr. Mercer was able to sail along the coasts of the country. assisting his father in their coast trading vessel; nearly every harbour saw their ship tied up at its docks and from these travels and a keen study of his country's economic conditions the doctor has been able to make a fair appraisal of his country's worth.

Newfoundland is becoming increasingly important in the field of economics and defense. Both Britain and Canada are receiving supplies of lumber, fish and minerals from this little country. During the year previous to the war Germany received over one million tons of iron ore from the Newfoundland mines. This supply now finds its way to Britain. On the strategic points of Newfoundland, the Americans have naval bases from which they harass the German u-boats. Newfoundland is now run by a commission. This was necessary because of her financial conditions a few years ago but she is gaining considerably in wealth because of changed conditions and expect soon to retake her position as the oldest Dominion in the British

Grey County's quota of two and a half million dollars is the same as in the last loan, which was carried to such a successful completion. His Honor Judge Morley, chairman of the Grey County committee, and those associated with him in the organization work for Grey County are enthusiastic about the prospects for success on the present loan.

Much dependence is being placed on the rural sections of the county. Both local and county committees are hopeful that the canvass among the farmers will produce an especially good return. Quotas in each municipality were announced last week. They are stiff quotas, but not impossible of attainment, if the canvassers will work, as they have declared they will, and if the general public realizes the seriousness of the situaion, and the vital need for this cash at the present time.

It is being pointed out that the Dominion Government is now the farmer's best customer. But the government has to have the money with which to buy the farmer's produce. If the farmers will take some of the money they are now receiving for their farm produce and turn it into Victory Bonds, the government will be enabled to spend the money again with the farmer, for further purchases of produce.
