The bride changes her name . . . often both the bride and the groom change their address.

Also, when any registered person moves at any th from one address to another, he or she is required by law to notify the National Registration autho.itles

Byery person in Canada, 16 years of age and over, unless exempted in writing, must be registered. It is a patriotic duty to comply with the National Registration regulations. You will avoid substantial

Every person, so registered, who afterwards marries nges his or her address must report within 14 days to the Chief Registrar for Canada.

All registered persons are required by law to have their registration certificates in their immediate possession at all times. You may be required to produce your registration certificate, by the proper authorities,

Every duly registered person whose registration cortificate has been lost, destroyed, worn out or defaced, should obtain a duplicate certificate. (Necessary forms and instructions for this purpose may be obtained from any Postmaster in Canada.)
