This is to remind you that within thirty days after attaining your sixteenth birthday you are required by law to attend at any Post Office in Canada and obtain Office in Postmaster your from the Postmaster your National Registration certificate. report the change on a card available at any Post Office. All registered persons are required by law to have their registration certificates in their immediate possession of all times. You may be required to produce your registration certificate, by the proper authorities, at any time. It is a patriotic duty to comply with the National Registration regulations. You will avoid substantial penalties by doing so. If you have reached your sixteenth birthday, and, by chance, have not registered, you should do so at once.
