Bantams Take Second Straight Victory

After a "struggle and a half" the Markdale Bantams came through with a 5-4 victory over Flesherston on Monday night. Although handicapped by the smaller ice and poorer lighting to some extent, the Markdale team had a number of rooters along, including several ardent parents, so there was encouragement plus for them. It is good to see so many getting behind this great little team this year, and it is to be hoped that when Flesherston plays the return game here on Wednesday, February 3rd, the whole town will get behind them and really boost. The rink management has revised the admission price for this game to 10c and 15c in an effort to increase crowds, and this move on their part will no doubt be heartily accepted by both children and adults.

As the game started off it was immediately evident that the Flesherston team was one to be reckoned with very seriously. They have several excellent little players in Turney, Teeter, McTavish, and their clever goalie Banks. The two teams were fairly well matched in size, although Mel York for the home team, probably the biggest and fastest man on the ice, still has an aversion to cracking down with that weight of his. It should be interesting to see him go by the end of the season when he may have overcome this, as the Markdale fans are looking to see a real hockey player develop here.

The first line of McTaggart, York and Alton had to play most of the game due to the calibre of the Flesherston boys, but they were ably assisted by Gord Cherry and Bert Scott on defence. In the opening frame McTaggart scored, assisted by Alton, while Cherry and Scott each scored unassisted to make it 3-1. In the second period York scored but Flesherston did too, making it 4-2. During this period the second line of "stalwarts", Curt Ryan, Don Kidd and Hugh Merriam, really stuck to orders and worried the much larger Flesherston lads so much that they did not score at all. Curt Ryan also did yeoman service in filling in on defence several times. This youngster is skating faster each game and playing nice hockey. Kidd and Merriam are hard workers and real checkers for their size. In the third period Flesherston really put on a power play and never let up, showing real condition and fight, bottling the Markdale boys up badly several times. They scored to make it 4-3 but McTaggart passed to York, who was really on his toes, to keep the lead and make it 5-3. In the closing few minutes Flesherston scored again to make it 5-4, but could not break through for a tie.

Cherry showed nice individual puck carrying several times, and passed better than usual. McTaggart, as always, the spark plug of the team, played his usual good game, and Alton really went to town. However, if it had not been for our own good goalie, Maurice Wiley, the score would have shown a decided reversal. He was right in there all the time, and stopped a lot of tough ones. Probably the biggest disappointment of the night was in not seeing little Ross Ryan play, he being considered a little too small to play against such a heavy and fast team. Ross, you will remember, scored the outstanding goal of the Chatsworth game, and he is looking forward to more like it against the smaller teams before the year is out.

Dr. J. M. Gnaniah Spoke To Rotarians On Tuesday

Dr. J. M. Gnaniah, a noted Indian scholar, for some months owing to ill health, a resident at Chatsworth, was the guest speaker on Tuesday evening at the Rotary Club meeting. In order to accommodate a larger gathering adjournment was made from the Legion Hall to the Department of Agriculture which was comfortably filled. It was Ladies' Night at the Club meeting and all members were present with the Rotarians. Dr. J. A. McArthur proposed the toast to the ladies which was ably responded to by Mrs. A. E. Hunt.

At the after meeting Mr. W. J. Messenger, president of the club, presided and the speaker was introduced by Mr. R. T. Dunlop of Chatsworth and at the close Mr. F. D. Sawyer thanked the visitor.

Dr. Gnaniah told of conditions in India and of his early life and education in his native land. He later went to England where he took university courses and was also ordained as a Baptist clergyman. He gave Britain credit for being of much assistance to India. While India in some sections has not appreciated what Britain has done for them, without their assistance there would have been very little advancement. The speaker is a loyal British subject and has little use for those who are not what they would have people believe they are. People who are not honest with themselves cannot be trusted by those with whom they associate. Some people never grow up but continue all their lives to play with toys. It was a worthwhile address which should improve the morals and stability of those who heard it.

Mrs. Joseph Graham

Mrs. Frances E. Graham, 80, widow of Joseph Graham, pioneer livery stable proprietor here, died Thursday at the family home, 16 St. Paul Street, following a brief illness. Mrs. Graham had resided in Port Arthur 55 years.

Born in Cookstown, Ont., Mrs. Graham was married in the East and lived in Markdale, Ont., for some years before coming to Port Arthur, or Prince Arthur's Landing as it was known in the early 1880's.

Mr. Graham operated a livery stable business on the site now occupied by the Lyceum Theatre, Cumberland Street, and later built a stable at the corner of St. Paul and Cooke Streets. The Graham home, one of the city landmarks, was erected about 50 years ago. Mr. Graham died 25 years ago.

Mrs. Graham was one of the oldest members of St. Paul's United Church and an honorary life member of the Women's Federation of the church.

Surviving are two sons, two daughters, three brothers, 14 grandchildren, five great grandchildren and one sister. Sons are Sam and Percy Graham, Port Arthur. Daughters are Ara, Mrs. H. W. Guerdard, and Myrtle, Mrs. J. J. Doherty, Port Arthur. Brothers are Rev. A. J. Irwin, Toronto; W. H. Irwin, Tampa, Florida, and E. E. Irwin, Lapeer, Mich. The sister is Mrs. J. Switzer, St. George, Ont.

Six of the grandchildren are in the armed services. A seventh, Irwin Graham, R.C.A.F., was killed in a bombing raid over Germany and was buried at Kiel, Germany.

The funeral was held Saturday afternoon with a service at the chapel, 21 North Court Street, and burial in Riverside Cemetery. Rev. T. S. Watson, St. Paul's United Church, officiated. The service included the two hymns, Rock of Ages and Safe in the Arms of Jesus, J. T. Hodges playing the organ accompaniment. Pallbearers were G. Brady, E. S. Rutledge, A. Fisher, R. Gustavson, A. Bullock and D. McIntyre.
