Mrs. Frances E. Graham, 80, widw of Joseph Graham, ploneer livery table proprietor here, died Thursday at the family home, 16 St. Paul Street, following a brief illness, Mrs. Graham had resided in Port Arthur 58 years.

Born in Cookstown, Ont., Mrs. Graham was married in the East and lived in Markdale, Ont., for some years before coming to Port Arthur, or Prince Arthur's Landing as it was nown in the early 1880's.

Mr. Graham operated a livery stable business on the site now occupled by the Lyceum Theatre, Cumberland Street, and later built 2 stable at the corner of St. Paul and Cooke Streets. The Graham home, one of the city landmarks, was erected about 50 years ago. Mr. Graham died 25 years ago.

Mrs. Graham was one of the oldest members of St. Paul's United Church and an honorary life member of the Women's Federation of the church.

Surviving are two sons, two daughters, three brothers, 14 grandchildren, five great grandchildren and one sister. Sons are Sam and Percy Graham, Port Arthur. Daughters are Ara, Mrs. H. W. Guerard, and Myrtle, Mrs. J. J. Doherty, Port Arthur. Brothers are Rev. A. J. Irwin. Toronto; W. H. Irwin, Tampa, Florida, and E. E. Irwin, Lapeer, Mich. The sister is Mrs. J. Switzer, St. George, Ont.

Six of the grandchildren are in the armed services. A seventh, Irwin Graham, R.C.A.F., was killed in a bombing raid over Germany and was buried at Kiel, Germany.

The funeral was held Saturday afternoon with a service at the chapel. 21 North Court Street, and burial in Riverside Cemetery. Rev. T. S.
