Holland Centre Red Cross Society

The monthly meeting of the Holland Centre Red Cross Society was held in the hall on Wednesday, January 6th, with a good attendance of members and visitors. The meeting opened with two minutes of silent prayer for our soldiers, sailors and airmen, followed by the usual reports which were very encourag-Mrs. R. Edmunds, president, had charge of the meeting which took the form of a work display, revealing the untiring efforts of the organization in this community.

A complete report of the knitting convener for 1942 was given and ecords the spending of \$150.00 for wool, from which the following articles were shipped: 250 pairs of socks, 26 turtle-neck sweaters, 32 scarves, 26 helmets and alternative caps, 20 sleeveless pullovers, 76 pairs of mitts, 6 pairs gloves from the Holland Centre Branch. The following was from Walters Falls Branch: 146 pairs socks, 21 turtle neck sweaters, 4 scarves, 12 pullovers, 45 pairs mitts and numerous children's knitted garments; from the Williamsford Branch, 36 pairs socks, 2 turtle-neck sweaters, scarves, 5 helmets, 10 pairs mitts and several children's garments.

The complete sewing report for 1942 is as follows: About 900 yards of material was used for sewing, which included 375 yards of flannel ette, 225 yards print, 95 yards cotton flannel, and 200 yards broadcloth. Some of this was sent to Williamsford, Moggie and Walters Falls. The following articles were returned and distributed: 24 quilts, 16 dresses, 12 pairs pyjamas, nighties, 1 bonnet, 1 girl's slip; from Williamsford 1 baby dress, 1; quilts, 4 dresses, 12 slips, 8 pairs bloomers, 9 pairs girl's pyjamas from Holland Centre: 67 quilts, 30 pairs pyjamas, 11 pairs bloomers, girl's skirts, 1 girl's coat, 2 girl's dresses, 2 jumper skirts, 3 pairs boy's pants, 3 dozen handkerchiefs, baby slips, 5 baby nightles, 12 ditty bags and contents, and 2 baby dresses.
