Markdale Pupils Buy War Savings Stamps

Principal W. J. Messenger reports that when the books were closed for the War Savings campaign for 1942 for Markdale Public School it was found that the pupils had invested \$448.08 in War Savings Certificates and stamps. One pupil had purchased a \$50.00 Victory Bond which is being paid for on the instalment plan out of the wages he earns working in a store on Saturdays and after school hours.

The plan started off with plenty of enthusiasm and one would expect it to drop off as time passed but such is not the case as the record shows that in January of this year the pupils have saved \$51.34. The money is saved out of regular allow ances and represents a sacrifice of chewing gum, candy and other youngsters' delights. Some pupils supplemented their savings by earning money shovelling snow, piling wood, cutting grass, working at the stores, delivering papers, minding younger children and other odd jobs.



Papers Sent To Overseas Boys Must Be Paid For

The letter which appears below ias been received by C. V. Charters, Managing Director of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association. We do not like the idea of not being privileged to send the paper to the boys from our district who are now overseas, but will have to abide by the government order. In order that the boys may continue to receive The Markdale Standard each week we are making a special rate of only 50 cents per year and would suggest that the Council of each of the five municipalities from which the boys went overseas pay this small sum so that we may keep the service going and comply with the ruling. Here is the letter to which we refer above:

Ottawa, January 11, 1943 Dear Mr. Charters:

I wish to refer to previous corres pondence, respecting the conservation of shipping space. Notwithstanding the various steps we have taken with a view to curtailing the volume of newspapers and periodicals for overseas, the situation is still quite serious.

Recently our attention was invited to the fact that a considerable proportion of the volume of weekly newspapers mailed for overseas conof free or complimentary copies. We feel that, in view of the present conditions and of the fact that the general public are not permitted to forward copies of newspapers or periodicals to addresses overseas, it is only fair to request publishers to restrict their mailings to bona fide subscription copies.

It would be appeciated, therefore, if you would kindly advise your vention in Toronto this month. It members that, in future, mailings for overseas destinations must be call a meeting of the shareholders of confined to copies addressed to bona the Markdale Rink and Community
