Jim was the eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robt. Bartley of the 10th con., pioneer parents. He had passed his 70th year by 7 days. He grew up a bit of a farm hand, but was an enterprising and for many years owned and operated a big threshing outfit that for years did all the work on the west end of the 6th, 8th, 10th and 12th concessions. Always a hustler and genial and obliging, he was a man's friend. He was wedded to Sam Bell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Bell and to them were born three sons and one daughter, Noble, Alfred, Raymond and Mary of Calgary. They sold out here and moved to Elbow over forty years or more ago, followed farming there in the Elbow district. The funeral took place in the United Church at Elbow on Jan. 8th, and was largely attended. Among those from a distance were Mr. Will Bell of Edmonton and his brother, Mr. Wm. Bartley of North Saskatchewan. Our scope has many happy memories of the deceased and our deep sympathy is extended to his devoted partner and the members of the family.
