A highly respected and well known Holland township resident, James P. Hare, passed away on Sunday at the home of his niece, Mrs. Roy Whieldon at Arnott, with whom he had made his home for some years. The late Mr. Hare, who was in his 85th year, had been ill for two years.

W. J. Boyle Writes From Hawarden, Sask.

In remitting for *The Standard* Mr. W. J. Boyle, a former resident here, says:

Hawarden, Jan. 25th, 1943

Although thirty-four years in the West I would not like to be without *The Markdale Standard* which comes as a weekly letter from the town and surrounding country of my boyhood days. Many of the names are new to me but I enjoy seeing the names of those I knew and associated with. I always like reading the news items from the different correspondents, especially is that true of Townsend Lake and Traverston.

Our district, like a great portion of the West, had a bountiful crop of all kinds of grain this fall, although winter weather came on before all threshing was completed.

Our Government Wheat Board sees to it that we don't put too much of the wheat on the market. They issue us a quota from time to time to sell a few bushel on a basic acreage, not on our sown crop, but on 65% of our 1940 sown crop. Up to the present time we have been issued ten bushels on that acreage which does not provide funds enough to pay the harvest and threshing expenses. Our full quota for the present crop year is fourteen bushel on the said basic acreage. That means that many farmers will have a lot more wheat to provide storage for than they can sell during the crop year.

We are very grateful to have such a wonderful crop which provides plenty of feed for livestock and those farmers who have a number of stock can profit by feeding surplus grain to them.
