They is sue us a quota from time to time to bushels on that acreage which does not provide funds enough to pay the harvest and threshing expenses. Our full quota for the present crop year is fourteen bushel on the said basic acreage. That means that many farmers will have a lot more wheat to provide storage for than they can sell during the crop year.

We are very grateful to have such stock can profit by feeding surplus grain to them.
