WHAT SCIENCE IS DOING

ADRENALIN FOR FLIERS When we are fighting mad two little glands which are called ad-renals and which lie above the kidneys are aroused to chemical action. The glands pour out adrenalin. Some classic experiments made years ago by Dr. Walter B. Cannon (Harvard) have shown how essential adrenalin is in the emotional life of all higher ani-mals. It stimulates the heart so that it can work harder. Without Dr. George W. Stavraky (Uni-

versity of Western Ontario) has applied this knowledge for the benefit of the Royal Canadian Air Force. He conducted research to discover the effects of a deficiency of oxygen at altitudes of more than 10,000 feet. He determined the exact amounts of oxygen and carbon dioxide needed for the best action of adrenai glands. He found that unless a man's blood oxygen and carbon dioxide the adrenals do not perform their func efficiently. Hence the man can't fight.

SULFA FOR SICK TREES After a five-year test, F. A. Bartlett, a tree expert, announces that the bleeding canker disease of shade trees can be successfully treated by injections of one of the sulfanamides. Ailing trees treated by the method and properly fed showed an average annual ncrease of twig growth of more than three inches over similar trees neither treated nor fed. The new method of treatment was initiated at Rhode Island State College several years ago when it eral Eastern States were dying of an unknown fungus. After isolation, the disease proved to be bleeding canker. The compound, a "sulfa" derivative, was applied through injections. A total of 6,-011 injections was made on 322



A few weeks ago, relates The Kansas City Times, the British eruiser H.M.S. Seylla (Capt. I. A. P. MacIntyre), on patrol duty in the North Atlantic, was informe that a large German cargo ship was attempting to run the block ade and reach a French port. After a 200-mile chase the Scylla overtook the vessel and fired warning salvo ahead of her. In stead of stopping, the blockade runner shifted course, and the cruiser then fired directly at her. report: "Soon flames were seen coming from the superstructure of the enemy vessel, and it was noticed that the crew was abandoning ship. The cruiser ceased fire until the lifeboats were clear of the ship, and then the blockade run ner was finally sunk with a tor as possible, because it was it lieved that German aircraft and U-boats might be in the vicinity and might be attracted to the scene by smoke from the burn-

ing ship."

Canada Keeps Inflation Away

\$50,000,000 in Subsidies Protects Prices Ceiling

From the end of March las year to the present time, according to a House of Commons return, the Prices Board has paid out \$50,000,000 in subsidies to protect its prices "ceiling." says The Ottawa Journal.

This looks like a lot of money; a lot of money, at any rate, to protect a ceiling. Actually, it is but a bagatelle in comparison with what the people of Canada would have had to pay out if there

had been no prices ceiling.

A jump of one point in the cost of living index means roughly \$30,000,000 out of the pockets o Canadian consumers. Therefore, if we were without a prices ceiling and the cost of living had gone up, say, four points (which would not have been extraordinary) what we would have paid would not have been \$50,000,000. but \$120,000,000. We think the idea of a steel strike should make every citizen of Canada as hopping mad as it makes us. Don't get us wrong. We aren't Union haters, or "Company men." We believe well-ran and responsible unions can benefit every on. We also know that basic wage rates may need to be adjusted from time to time, and there are other grievances in this plant as in most others.

Cannot Be Beaten By Any Enemy

What we object to is the use of strikes over which we have no control to force decisions in such matters in these times. The Government has set forth a policy of wage and price control to try and avoid troubles and hardships met in the last war. It also provides means for adjusting inequalities brought to its attention. Public opinion should demand quick, firm, and just use of this machinery to settle problems as they arise, and avoid situations such as we have here. To allow any group to dictate its own terms in any such dispute spells disaster for the whole national economy.

discusted, are not paying Union dues, and are completely inactive in Union affairs, but they are included in estimates of C.I.O. membership.

The strike issue here is Union recognition and collective bargaining, with the pay increase an incidental. Through our Works Council we already have a collective bargaining agreement through elected representatives, free of charge. The Union guarantees to give us the same thing for about \$50,000 in dues. We do not take our Works Council seriously enough, or make it work as it should, because we didn't have to fight for it.

5 No discrimination is shown against Union members in the plant. Union representatives sit on the Works Council. We feel that this projected strike is part of a planned program to unionize Canada's steel industry, no matter at what cost to the country—YOUR country. The C.I.O. is following a familiar pattern which has been very successful in the States. Strong and decisive action is needed immediately to prevent further trouble, and forestall a general inflation. Management's hands are tied, the Government is unwilling and unable to act without some overwhelming expression of public opinion.

Now is your chance to do something concrete to prevent a minority subotaging our war effort. Write the Government. Express your opinions in the papers, and make sure any man who supports a strike in these times realizes what he is doing.
