Sgt.-Pilot Walter Dixon Killed In Action Overseas

Mr. and Mrs. Russell Dixon of that their son, Sgt.-Pilot Walter Dixon, had been killed overseas. No particulars were given.

Walter Dixon was born at Walters Falls twenty-four years ago, where he attended public school. Later he attended high school in Meaford. For a time he was employed in Dein various R.C.A.F. schools and received his wings at Moncton, N.B. He completed his course at Bagot ville, Quebec, and in October 1942, left for overseas-after visiting with his parents here. Shortly after arriving overseas he contacted his brother, Trooper Mac Dixon, who had been in England for several months. Early this year he suffered a broken leg when he slipped on the ice and only recently had returned to duty with his unit.

Deceased is survived by his par ents; one brother, Trooper Mac Dixwho has been overseas sinc 1941; four sisters, Mrs. Carson Whieldon in Owen Sound, Mrs Maurice Quinton at Walters Falls Misses Edna and Iva at home.

This is the fourth boy from Mark dale district to make the supreme sacrifice, the others being John Ben nett, Archie Macaulay and Mike Fugere. The Dixon family, as well as the other bereaved families, havthe genuine sympathy of all in this terrible calamity.
