Beaton of Markdale sang two appropriate solos and at the close Mr. Wm. Morris of Meaford sounded the Last Post. The large church was crowded to the doors and many were unable to gain admittance. During the service the minister read a poem sent to Mr. and Mrs. Dixon by a chum of Walter's in Detroit, where he had worked immediately before enlisting. Here is the poem:

Sawyer, managed and directed the work of the girls and the result of her work was to double the amount collected during the Tag Day for the Blind last year. The size of the gifts was noticeably larger than on previous tag days. A cheque for \$2.00 was received by the committee from Mr. Willis L. Muxlow; this was forwarded, with the proceeds of the day, to the Canadian National Institute for the Blind committee in Owen Sound.

## Phil. Kelley Killed In Motor Accident Monday Night

Mr. Philip Kelley, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Kelley of Markdale, was killed Monday night in a motor accident which occurred on Highway 10, about a mile south of Berkeley. Mr. Kelley was on his way from Goderich to Markdale and at Chaisworth had picked up Mr. Samuel Bestward, who had visited with his daughter there. When about opposite the farm of Mr. Robt. Bradley the lights of the car went out and when the brakes were applied the car left the road and went through the fence on the east side of the road. Mr. Kelley and Mr. Bestward signalled approaching cars and Mr. Harold Fawcett of Flesher-ton, driving south, responded and stopped. Mr. Bestward got into this car and Mr. Kelley was talking to the driver on the left side of the car when another car, driven by Mr. Bruce Marshall of this place, crashed into the rear left side of the Fawcett car. Mr. Kelley was badly cut about the head and neck, supposedly by glass, and the jugular vein was severed. He bled to death in a few minutes.

Dr. R. L. Carefoot was called and he and Dr. Lindsey of Dundalk, who was in the hospital at the time, responded to the call. Nothing could be done as Mr. Kelley had then passed away. The body was brought to the Oliver Funeral Home and on Tuesday afternoon a jury viewed the remains and adjourned for an inquest on Friday afternoon.

The late Philip Kelley was born in Markdale about forty years ago and spent most of his life here. For the past few years the family has resided at Goderich. Three years ago he married Miss Blanche McClarty, who continued in the employ of the Bank of Montreal here. He is also survived by four brothers and two sisters, namely: Joseph and Leo in Goderich; Patrick at Campbellford and Dr. Charles in Buffalo; Miss Loretta in Goderich and Miss Gertrude in Toronto.

The funeral will be held on Thursday with service in St. Mary's Church, Owen Sound, at 9 a.m. Interment will be made in St. Mary's Cemetery, Owen Sound.

The sympathy of the whole community goes out to Mrs. Kelley, who has been so suddenly bereft of her husband, and to the brothers and sisters in their bereavement.

## Holland Centre Y. P. S. Present Easter Cantata.

Well Filled Church Received Easter Presentation With Great Applause

On Easter Monday evening, the Young People's Society of the Holland Centre United Church, presented "Life at Easter-tide", an Easter Cantata revealing the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ in song and story. There were 37 voices in the choir under the direction of the pastor, Mr. Robert Watt, with Miss Mildred Harper at the piano. Rev. Geo. Coulter of Chatsworth, supervising pastor of the circuit, presided, introducing the Cantata and leading in the congregational hymns, also bringing a fine address between part one and part two.

A piano duet, entitled, "Diadem", by Misses Mildred Harper and Isabel McMullen, opened the first part of the program, followed by the opening chorus by the choir, entitled, "Life at Easter-tide". Kenneth Craven read a brief Scripture lesson from Matthew 28 and this was followed by the second chorus, "Bells of Easter Ring", with piano expressions of chimes fittingly rendered. A piano duet by Misses Doris Watt and Doris Craven, "The Old Rugged Cross", was well received. Miss Dorothy Beirnes gave a recitation entitled, "The Waiting Vision", which was followed by a duet, "Brighter than the Sunlight", by Misses Mildred and Evelyn Harper, accompanied by Miss Isabel McMullen at the piano. Misses May Jackson recited "Risen", after which the choir rendered a descriptive question and answer song, "Jesus is Risen". Following this was a recitation entitled, "The Man Called Jesus" by Allan Shaw. Miss Vivian Watt sang a solo entitled, "Lozse Ago", assisted in the chorus by her sister, Miss Doris Watt. Miss Phyllis Rutledge followed by a well-expressed recitation "My Redeemer". Mrs. Watt and Mrs. Mandeno rendered "Joy is Waiting", and free girls concluded the first part of the Cantata by an exercise entitled "Five Silver Stepping Stones", namely: Love, Kindness, Loyalty, Faith and Giving.

The second part of the Cantata was introduced with a piano duet, "Intermezzo" by Misses Mildred Harper and Isabel McMullen, followed by the choir selection, "O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing". Miss Doris Craven, as Easter, led in the exercise, "Telling the Tidings", assisted by four girls and two boys: Carole, Flowers and Heralds, with the choir singing, "Christ the Lord is Risen Today". The male voices led in the next number, "Up from the Grave He Arose", with the rest of the choir joining in the chorus which proved a very fine rendering. Miss Doris Watt recited a very effective, "An Empty Sepulchre" and was followed by a very impressive solo, "Wounded for Me", rendered by Miss Isabel McMullen who also gave in a very descriptive manner, the poem entitled, "Adoration". The closing chorus, "He Lives", was the triumphant conclusion of the choir while a double piano duet, entitled, "Over Hill and Dale" by Misses Mildred Harper, Isabel McMullen, Evelyn Harper and Doris Watt was the crowning number and brought to a close a splendid presentation of this Easter Cantata.

After words of appreciation by the pastor, Mr. Robert Watt, the congregation joined in singing a hymn followed by the benediction. The choir has received several requests to repeat this in other places.
