Phil. Kelley Killed In Motor **Accident Monday Night**

Mr. Philip Kelley, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Kelley of Mark-dale, was killed Monday night in a motor accident which occurred on Highway 10, about a mile south of Berkeley. Mr. Kelley was on his way from Goderich to Markdale and at Chaisworth had picked up Mr. Samuel Bestward, who had visited with his daughter there. When about opposite the farm of Mr. Robt. Bradley the lights of the car went out and when the brakes were applied the car left the road and went through the fence on the east side of the road. Mr. Kelley and Mr. Bestward signalled approaching cars and Mr. Harold Fawcett of Flesherton, driving south, responded and motor accident which occurred or and Mr. Harold Fawcett of Flesherton, driving south, responded and stopped. Mr. Bestward got into this car and Mr. Kelley was talking to the driver on the left side of the car when another car, driven by Mr. Bruce Marshall of this place, crashed into the rear left side of the Fawcett car. Mr. Kelley was badly cut about the head and neck, supposedly by glass, and the jugular vein was severed. He bled to death in a few minutes.

The late Philip Kelley was born in Markdale about forty years ago and spent most of his life here. For the past few years the family has resided at Goderich. Three years ago he married Miss Blanche Mc-Clarty, who continued in the employ of the Bank of Montreal here. He is also survived by four brothers and two sisters, namely: Joseph and Leo in Goderich; Patrick at Campbellford and Dr. Charles in Buffalo; Miss Loretta in Goderich and Miss Gertrude in Toronto.

The funeral will be held on Thursday with service in St. Mary's Cemetery, Owen Sound, at 9 a.m. Interment will be made in St. Mary's Cemetery, Owen Sound.
