# Second Compulsory Employment Transfer Order

Notice to Certain Employers and Employees that men in specified lines of civilian employment, in classes already designated under National Selective Service Mobilization Regulations, must report for interview not later than June 15th, 1943, at an Employment and Selective Service Office.

A. Objective: This Second Order makes available for essential employments the ser-vices of men in classes already designated under National Selective Service Mobilization Regulations, who are now employed in speci-fied non-essential employments.

B. EMPLOYMENTS COVERED BY THIS ORDER: Men, of the specified categories, are covered if now employed at: ORDER: Men, of the specified categories, are correct if now employed at:

(1) Any occupation in or associated with retail stores; (2) any occupation in or associated with the manufacturing of feathers, plames and artificial flowers; chewing gum; wine; lace goods; greeting cards; jeweljy; (3) any occupation in or associated with the factory production of Deverage; (4) any occupation in or associated with the factory production of the following occupations: but boys; charmen and cleaners; castom furriers; dancing teachers; dish washers; doormen and starters; greens keepers; grounds keepers; private chantfeurs.

ACE AND MARITAL CLASSES OF EN COVERED BY THIS ORDER:

widower since July 15, 1940, and is without child or children now living; (d) every man born from 1902 to 1916 (inclusive) who, since July 15, 1940, has been divorced or Judicially separated.

D. Procedure to be Followed; All men as D. Procedure to be Followed: All filed as defined above must report to an Employment and Selective Service Office nor later than June 15th, 1943. Men resident outside a city or town having an Employment and Selective Service Office, too far removed to call personally, may write to the nearest office, and await further directions.

J. Authority: This Order is issued by the Minister of Labour under National Selective Service Civilian Regulations (P.C. 246 of January 19th, 1943, and amending Orders in Council).

K. This Second Order is Additional to First Order: Employments listed in Para-graph B above, declared non-essential in this Second Order, are additional to the nonor town having an Employment and Selective
Service Office, too far temored to call personally, may write to the nearest office, and await further directions.

E. OBLICATIONS OF EMPLOYEES:
When directed to accept employment, men referred to in Paragraphs B and C above are required by the Regulations to follow the direction.

F. OBLICATIONS OF EMPLOYEES: It will be illegal for an employer to retain in his employ after Jane 15th, 1943, any men referred to in Paragraphs B and C above nuless a special permit has been obtained from Selective Service.

G. Transportation: Provision will be made for transportation of men moved to a new place of residence.

H. Appeals: If objecting to transfer to other employment when directed, a man may enter appeal with a Court of Referees within 1 days.

I. Penalties: Penalties are provided for either employer or employers failing to comply with this Order.

Men referred to above must present documents at the employment office, indicating compliance with Mobilisation Regulations
