During the years of the last war 720,000,000 pounds of bacon were shipped to the old land. After the close of the war, because of an inferior product, the amount shipped fell off until in 1931 only 1-1,000,000 pounds were shipped and the price fell to \$3.50 per hundred. By better feeding methods and careful handling this year's shipments will reach 675,000,000 pounds. . If the Canadian farmer does his job well we will eventually have a tremendous market in England but we must supply what they want.

Mr. T. S. Cooper introduced the speaker and Gordon Beaton thanked him on behalf of the club.

RATION NEWS

The canning sugar coupons have een mailed with the exception of a few, for which no addresses given by the applicants at the time application was made for the sugar. So if you have failed to receive your coupons, kindly notify the Local Ra-tion Board at Flesherton at once and include your complete address. According to recent announce-ment by the Sugar Administrator, sugar purchased with Sugar Canning Coupons may be used for making jam from dried fruits such as prunes. No sugar is allowed for jam or jelly made with pectin as jam or jelly made without pectin uses two and one-quarter times as much fruit as that made with pectin. No canning sugar is to be used to make pickles or for the home canning of vegetables. Sugar saved from your weekly ration may be

applies also to the canning of marrow, pumpkins or tomatoes. American visitors to Canada will be granted sugar for home canning provided their stay is longer than eight weeks. Application should be made to the Local Ration Board. Allowance will not exceed 10 lbs per person.

When filling in the necessary form to obtain a new ration book for a child, be sure it is completely filled in and that the declaration is signed before a Commissioner or other public official as requested, unless a birth certificate or baptismal certificate is forwarded with the pleted form to the Local Ration Board at Flesherton.

Sugar, tea and coffee coupons 1-8 are now valid and are good until declared invalid. Nos. 9 and 10 are due June 24th.

Butter coupons 12-15 are now valid and will expire June 30th. Coupons 16 and 17 are due June 24th and will expire July 31st.

Meat coupons marked 1-3 now valid and will expire June 30th. Coupons marked 4 are due June 17 and expire July 31st.

A resident of the Harkaway district for about thirty years, Mr. Dav-id Laird Binns passed to his reward quite suddenly on Wednesday, June 2nd. He had been ill since January but had improved so that he was a bout the house and on the day in which he died had dinner with the other members of the family.
