Protecting Highway By Planting Wind Break

Tree planting as a means of con trolling drifting snow is an experinent which is being tried out by the Ontario Department of Highways on a 12-mile stretch of Highway No. 10 from a point two miles south of Dundalk to Flesherton. Land to a depth of 107 feet from the present fence line has been purchased from farmers on the west side of the highway and has been bought in which have given trouble with drifting snow.

If the experiment proves a success the move may become general throughout the province.

Gangs of men are busily engaged this week planting young trees in the newly purchased land along this stretch of Highway 10, which gave snowplow crews many a headache during the past winter.

The rows of trees are six feet apart and the back row is twelve feet from the fence. Scotch pine, red pine and spruce are the trees which are being planted in ordinary ground and a variety of hedge tree known as caragana arborescens in the low places. All told there will be about two and a half miles of trees planted on the 12-mile stretch of road on the west side, which is the direction of the prevailing wind.

At the Flesherton end of the pro ject another large group of men have been at work planting.

RATION NEWS

Meat rationing became effective on May 27th. Spare A (brown) coupons are to be used and each per son may use two coupons a week Meat has been divided into four groups. Charts showing the coupon value for each group and the classi fication of the cuts of the rationed meats have been distributed to every householder. Heart, tongue, liver kidneys, brains, sweetbreads, weiners and bologna, spare ribs, oxtails and pigs' feet are not rationed.

Farmers may slaughter livestock or their own use and may sell home-killed meat to other farmers for consumption on their own farm premises but must not sell meat to anyone else. Coupons must be collected from the purchaser at the rate of one coupon for each two pounds of meat sold. Local farmer "beef rings" may operate but meat may be supplied by these "beef ringa" only to farmers. Farmers who slaughter for their own use must notify the Local Ration Board at Flesherton but no permit is re quired. At the end of each month coupons must be sent to the local Ration Board at Flesherton but only half the valid coupons for himself and each member of his household need be sent in along with all the coupons collected from the sale of meat to other farmers. A farmer may keep half the number of each month's coupons for the purchase of so that variety of meat. A member of a 'beef ring" must also surrender his meat coupons on the basis of one coupon for each two pounds of meat.

The necessary forms and stamped nvelopes for sending each month's coupons may be secured from the

Local Ration Board at Flesherton. The canning sugar coupons have been mailed to every applicant. These coupons cannot be replaced if lost or destroyed. If for any reason an applicant does not receive canning sugar coupons the matter should be reported at once to the Local Ration Board. The Board makes no guarantee that new coupons will be issued but an investigation will be made as to the reason for their nondart, work, \$11.40; County of Grey, receipt. But no claims will be considered after June 10th.

The amount of sugar made available to this district would allow each person slightly more than 11 lbs. but as each coupon has the value of 5 lbs., the poundage of sugar allowed each person must be divisible by According to the instructions issued, the poundage of sugar had to be reduced to the nearest 5 lbs., not increased. Thus the distribution for this district was made according to the following schedule: A family of 1—10 lbs.; 2—20 lbs.; 3—35 lbs.; 4—45 lbs.; 5—55 lbs.; 6—70 lbs.; 7-80 lbs.; 8-90 lbs.; 9-105 lbs.; 10-115 ms.; 11-125 ms.; 12-135 ms.; 13-150 ms.

These shut-ins would appreciate a visit or other friendly attention on any day of the year, but Shut-in's Day-Sunday, June 6-is a day set apart especially for the exercise of our privilege of bringing heer to these lonely ones.
