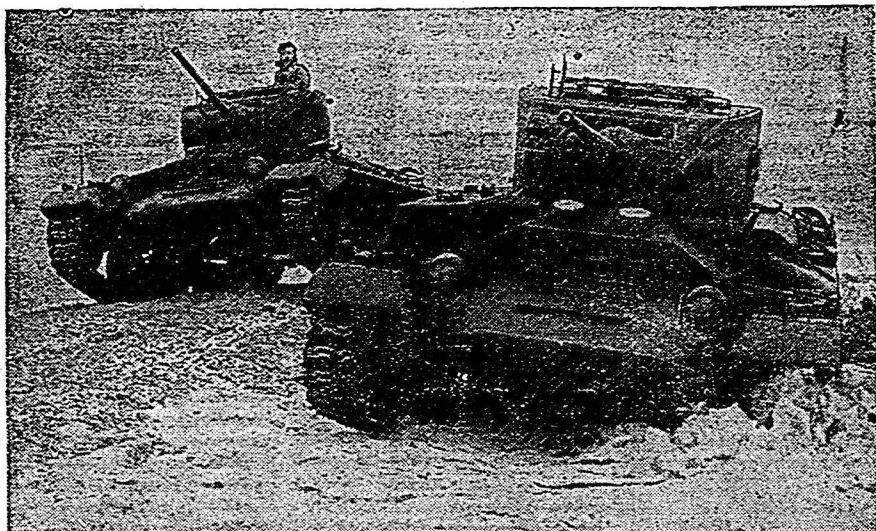

Russian General Praises Canadian Tanks



VALENTINE tanks, produced at the Canadian Pacific Railway's Angus Shops in Montreal, have been called by the Russians the best imported tanks they used in crushing Hitler's armor. Major General I. A. Elyayev, chairman of the Soviet Government Purchasing Commission in the United States, has been quoted by Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Munitions and Supply in Ottawa, as saying "the Canadian tanks Valentine VII have shown good results in combat action on our front, and have proved themselves the best of all our imported tanks." The Soviet general's tribute was in response to a request from Mr. Howe for a report on the Valentines' part in the Russian offensive. It preceded a congratulatory message sent by General Elyayev to H. B. Bowen, chief of motive power and rolling stock for the Canadian Pacific Railway, on the completion of the Valentine contract early in May, with the needs of a global war having dictated a switch to other weapons. At this time J. H. Berry, Canadian director general of tank production, also congratulated Mr. Bowen and Canadian Pacific personnel "for having delivered the goods on time." —Canadian Pacific Photo.
