WHAT SCIENCE IS DOING

PAPER IN WAR In a manner of speaking, we are almost literally "fighting this war on paper," for paper, in a multiproving indispensable in the war against our enemies.

According to Vance P. Edwardes of the International Paper Company, if the supply of all types and kinds of paper should be stopped suddenly, the war would end in six months, for there is only

About 30,000 pounds of blueprint paper are required in the building of a battleship. The army needs tuge quantitles of building paper. sanitary paper, cartons, shell con-tainers, code books, hospital supplies, printing, wrapping and writing papers, target paper, etc.

Packages resistant to water vapor have been developed for the protection of such foods as lemon lour, cereal, and dessert powders. Papers to protect articles during which are insect-proof, rat-proof. and capable of being submerged in the surf for 24 hours without damage to the contents. Much of the packaging for the army must e designed to withstand temperature variations of from 20 de-grees Fahrenheit below zero to 130 degrees above.

Paper also has been put to some ather astonishing and unprecedented uses. For instance, it has been used as a substitute for can-

vas in stretchers; as a substitute for steel strips in the strapping of light bundles; as fins to guide the flight of incendiary bombs; as hand grenade cases; for a substitute for burlap in sand bags;
