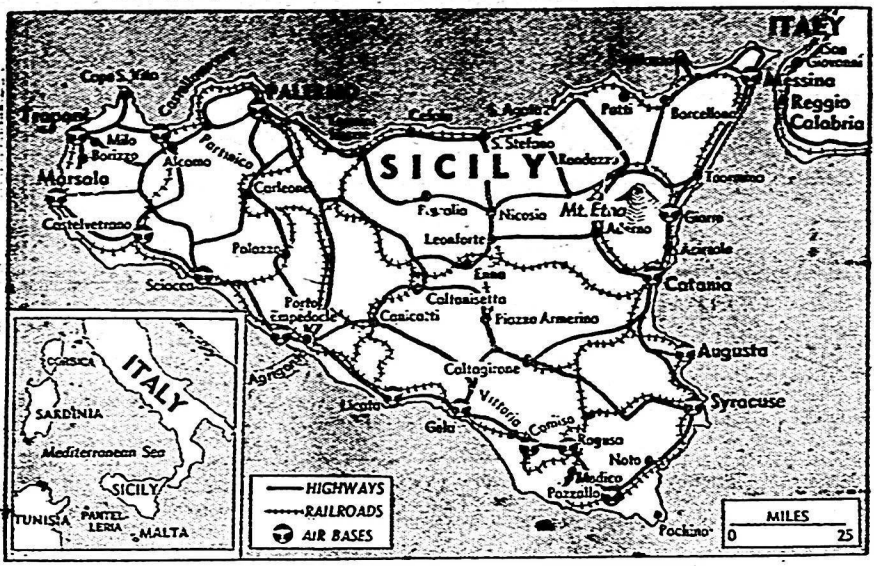


Invasion Routes on Threatened Italian Isle

How Can I?

Q. How can I lessen the noise of the electric fan?
A. The noise will be greatly lessened if the fan is placed on a folded Turkish towel before it is started.
Q. How can I retain the fresh color of vegetables?
A. Add a small particle of soda to the water when cooking green vegetables just before putting in the vegetables, and it will make them retain their fresh color.

3 Million Troops Carried: 1,384 Lost

Labor Peer Says Britannia Still Rules The Waves
Lord Winstanley said in a recent speech that British shippers had made 90 ships since the war began and had replaced by last September all naval losses suffered by the Royal Navy.
The Labor peer, frequently critical of the Admiralty, said this was evidence that Britannia still rules the waves.
He said 3,000,000 soldiers had been delivered overseas with the loss of only 1,384 men since the fall of France and that 5,000,000 tons of Axis shipping had been sunk and 3,000,000 tons damaged to March, 1942.
Two enemy battleships, 14 cruisers, 57 destroyers and many other lesser vessels have been sunk, he said, adding that the Italians had been unable to sink a single British ship so far.
Lord Winstanley said that in two out of three great convoys sent to North Africa, not a ship or a life was lost. Losses in convoy protection have been kept down to one-half one per cent, and the merchant navy has delivered 40,000,000 tons of imports annually, he said.
Lord Winstanley said at any given moment, 2,000 merchantmen and 600 warships were at sea.
Merchant naval casualties in the first three years of war were priced at 16,000.

WHAT SCIENCE IS DOING

PAPER IN WAR
In a manner of speaking, we are almost literally "fighting this war on paper," for paper, in a manifold way, is doing the most important work in the war against our enemies.
According to Vance P. Edwards of the International Paper Company, if the supply of all types and kinds of paper should be stopped suddenly, the war would end in six months, for there is only that much in reserve.
About 30,000 pounds of bleaching paper are required in the building of a battleship. The army needs huge quantities of building paper, sanitary paper, cartons, shell containers, code books, hospital supplies, and all kinds of writing papers, target paper, etc.
And all of these military uses are over and above the enormous quantities of paper used by civilians, including the emergency packing of many products previously put up in tin, thus effecting savings of millions of pounds of strategically important tin annually.
Packages resistant to water vapor have been developed for the protection of such foods as lemon powder, dehydrated vegetables and soups, powdered milk and eggs, flour, cereal, and instant noodles.
Papers to protect articles during shipping have been developed which are insect-proof, rat-proof, and fire-resistant.
Paper also has been put to some rather astonishing and unprecedented uses. For instance, it has been used as a substitute for canvas in stretchers; as a substitute for steel strips in the strapping of light bundles; as fins to guide the flight of incendiary bombs; as hand grenade cases; for a substitute for barlup in sand bags; etc.

Device Cuts Down Static On Radio

The static which comes in on a radio set is picked up and set to work eliminating its own noise in a new control announced by the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company.
The static eliminator will not be made for the public until after the war. It is a small device, made of electronic tubes, made to plug into any radio set. Ordinary radio signals, which carry broadcast voice, come in with an average strength of about one-twenty-thousandths of a volt. Occasionally these radio signals are down to a millionth of a volt.

OTTAWA REPORTS

That the Farm Industry is Affected by Price Control On A Great Many Items
The following is a summary of the general position as of June 15. Although price control has originally included with ceiling regulations not applied to sales of farm products to dealers or processors, certain exceptions were subsequently made in the interests of all concerned. These exceptions include wool, farm butter, milk, certain grains and field crops, and maple products.
Ceiling price regulations, however, do apply in the case of farmers selling products direct to consumers, through market stalls or otherwise, when farmers become retailers to all intents and purposes and may not sell direct to consumers at prices higher than the highest lawful retail prices for the particular products prevailing in their own communities or districts at the time.
Minimum or "floor" prices are in effect in the case of some products.
Grains
Prices of cereal and food grains and certain field crops are fixed from time to time for both ceiling and floor purposes. For the most part these are dealt with by the Canadian Wheat Board.
Livestock
There are no ceiling prices on the sales by farmers of live cattle, calves, hogs, sheep or lambs. Definite ceiling prices have been established on the sale of meats of such animals at the wholesale and retail levels.
Floor Prices on Beef
An arrangement was announced for the establishment of floor prices on dressed beef which will have the effect of establishing floors on beef cattle prices.
When the Wool Board was formed in 1942 to take control of all wool in Canada, the prices to

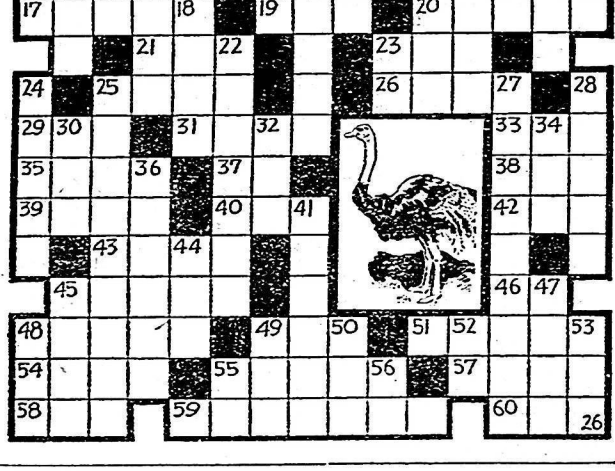
