The late Mr. Moran was a devout member of St. Paul's R. C. Church at Dornoch.

The funeral was held on Monday morning to St. Paul's Church with Requiem High Mass being sung by Rev. Father Mulhall of Durham and Dornoch parishes. The service at the graveside was conducted by Rev. Father Nolan of Markdale with interment in St. Paul's cemetery.

The death of a highly esteemed resident of Markdale occurred at the Collingwood Hospital early Wednesday morning when Mrs. P. J. Thompson passed away. The late Mrs. Thompson had been in poor health for more than a year, during which time she received treatment in Toronto and at the local hospital here. Recently she went to Stayner to visit, but her condition grew worse and a few days ago she was admitted to the Collingwood hospital.

The late Mrs. Thompson had been a resident of this village for over 35 years or ever since her marriage to P. J.
