6. The Provincial Hydro System Will Be Removed From Political This great publicly owned system was organized and developed by a former Conservative Government. The Liberal Regime which assumed office in 1934 almost succeeded in wrecking it. A new Government under the leadership of George A. Drew would adjust service rates on an equitable basis. It is planned to ease the burden on farm services.

7. Men and Women Who Have Served Their Country In War Will Be Given Priority In Peace.
This is the least that should be done for those who volunteer to risk their lives in fighting our battles.

The foregoing seven features of Progressive Conservative Policy I endorse as sincerely and as whole-heartedly as the seven presented in last week's issue of this newspaper. 1. This Order applies to all persons planning to purchase Class A fuels, namely, anthracite (hard) coal, low volatile bituminous coal, briquettes or coke, for heating any premises in Ontario or Quebec.

Forms will be available from all dealers in the near future. After completion the form must be left with the dealer from whom you are planning to purchase.

No delivery of coal will be made to any person who has not sent in a properly completed form, even if the coal was ordered or paid for prior to this regu-

EXEMPTIONS — This Order does not apply to:—

A. Consumers who use only high volatile bituminous coal.

Consumers of anthracite coal in the sizes known as buckwheat or smaller; or of low volatile bituminous screenings

Consumers of coal and coke used in the business of baking food products.

Consumers of foundry coke.
