Hon. Geo. Drew will become Ontario's Premier after an Ontario-wide election on Wednesday, August 4th. Out of the 90 seats in the legislature, a possible 39 seats will be occupied by Progressive-Conservatives, 33 by the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation, 14 by the Liberal Association, 1 Independent Liberal in the person of Mitch. Hepburn, former Premier of Ontario and 2 Labour candidates.

While no party won a majority of the 90 seats, it is generally believed that Co. Drew will be asked to form a government for Ontario.

Whether Col. Drew will see fit to form a coalition with at least some Liberals, or will form a government of his own party remains to be seen.

Possibly the lightest vote in years—approximately little over a million votes were polled in Wednesday's voting compared with more than 1,500,000 in 1934 and 1937.

In South Grey Farquhar Oliver, former member of the cabinet, took the lead. Seven of eleven other cabinet ministers were defeated.

In North Grey Roland Patterson, Liberal candidate was re-elected with a majority of 371 over Dr. "Mac" Phillips, Conservative candidate, and 1212 over the C.C.F.

In Markdale, a total of 420 votes were polled, over half of which were for A. E. Colgan, Progressive-Conservative.

RATION NEWS

According to a ruling of the War-time Prices and Trade Board, beef rings may operate but every farmer slaughtering for a beef ring must register with the Local Ration Board at Flesherton and must collect meat coupons, at the rate of 1 coupon for each 2 lbs. of meat, from the members of the beef ring at the time of the delivery of the meat. These must be sent at the end of each month to the Local Ration Board at Flesherton. Also all farmer members of a beef ring must register with the Local Ration Board. A number of members of beef rings as well as operators of beef rings have not yet registered. It is essential that this be done at once as inspectors will be making a check-up in this district within the next few weeks and the full penalty, as provided by the law, will be imposed on anyone who has not registered. If any further information is required, your local representative will gladly give you every assistance.

All canning sugar coupons are now valid. The August and September coupons became valid on July 26th. All coupons will expire on Sept. 30th.

Over 400 Members of G. & S. Foresters Attend Training Camp At Niagara

After two weeks of field training at Camp Niagara the boys from Markdale and surrounding district appeared a bronzed and happy group.

The special C.P.R. train bearing the members of "B" Company of the 2nd Battalion of the Grey and Simcoe Foresters, Reserve Army, arrived in Markdale shortly after 7 o'clock on Saturday evening.

Only a very small number were able to go from here on account of the shortage of labour to bring in hay. The officers and men from Markdale included, Captain F. D. Sawyer, Adjutant of the Regiment, St. Officer Sgt. A. Turney and Privates Francis Hughes, Leo Hughes, Eric Rimmer, Edison Boyce and Donald Burrell.

The four hundred in the 2nd Bn., Grey and Simcoe Foresters, who attended the camp report having a pleasant time. Fine weather prevailed during the entire camp. During their stay the men were housed in tents where good accommodation was provided. Route marches, tactical schemes and sleeping in the bush on the banks of the Niagara River were all good experiences for the men from Grey and Bruce. Work in camp was hard at times, as the boys underwent real training, but there was plenty of good food and recreation.

It is reported that the G. & S. Foresters made a good impression in camp and were highly thought of for their interest, keenness and discipline. Officials regarded this camp as one of the best camps since war was declared.

The local company will now resume its training period here in Markdale.
