RATION NEWS

According to a ruling of the War time Prices and Trade Board, beef rings may operate but every farmer slaughter killing for a beef ring must register with the Local Ration Board at Flesherton and must col lect meat coupons, at the rate of 1 coupon for each 2 lbs. of meat, from the members of the beef ring at the time of the delivery of the meat These must be sent at the end of each month to the Local Ration Board at Flesherton. Also all farmer members of a beef ring must register with the Local Ration Board. A number of members of beef rings as well as operators of beef rings have not yet registered. It is essential that this be done at once as inspectors will be making a check-up in this district within the next few weeks and the full penalty, as provided by the law, will be imposed on anyone who has not registered. If any further information s required, your local representative will gladly give you every as-
