

Berkeley United Church Congregation Celebrates Jubilee of Present Church

On Sunday, September 5th, Berkeley United Church congregation celebrates the fiftieth anniversary of the opening of the present building. Formerly the congregation worshipped in a small log building situated on the west back line on the property now occupied by Archie Burrell. It was called the Freeborn appointment. It would appear that the congregation saw the need of moving to a more convenient location and after much deliberation decided on the present lot on the highway, on which the church now stands. This lot was purchased from Mrs. James Wright.

Rev. John Pepper was the minister in charge at that time, although he was moved to another charge before the church was opened. He was instrumental in laying the plans for the splendid building now standing and in good repair after fifty years of constant use. On Sept. 22nd, 1892, at a special meeting called for the purpose, a building committee was appointed to act with Rev. Pepper, consisting of Bros. Wm. Sargent, Thos. Sargent, Joseph Lund, and John Love. To this committee was added Mr. R. Jameson at a later date. The members of the Trustee Board at that time consisted of Thos. Sargent, Wm. Sargent, Wm. Love, John Love, James Montgomery, George Ritchie, John Ritchie, Joseph Lund, R. Jameson and Thos. Middleton. Many of these names will be familiar to the residents of this district and we have just learned that two members of this board are still alive, one is Mr. John Love, who resides in Toronto and the other is Mr. John Rit-

chie, who resides in Dundalk. As far as can be ascertained at the moment, the others have passed on to their eternal reward but the church still stands as a memorial to their faithfulness to the Lord and to His Christ.

We are reminded, through the records, that the women also played an important part in the raising of funds by means of gospel tea meetings and also their faithfulness to the prayer meetings, etc. After fifty years of service of the church we look back and give much praise to the women. One available list of names on record is worthy of note and includes the following: Mrs. J. Love, Mrs. J. Ritchie, Mrs. Drinkwater, Mrs. Thos. Sargent, Mrs. Wm. Sargent, Mrs. Small, Mrs. Joseph Hudonson, Mrs. P. Rowe, Mrs. Jas. Montgomery, Mrs. Geo. Ritchie, Mrs. A. Ritchie, Mrs. Bradley, Mrs. Joe. Lund and others.

Mrs. Joseph Lund was honoured at that time by being permitted to choose the beautiful stained glass leaded windows for the church. Al-

though in poor health, she is still living and resides in Ontario, Calif., with her sister Tammy, who was known to many Berkeley residents through her frequent visits there. Mrs. Joseph Lund, who is now 87 years old, writes us to say that she still has the trowel which was used by Mr. Massey of Massey-Harris Co., Toronto, when he laid the corner stone.

The church was built under the supervision of Thos. Abbots, contractor, rough lumber being supplied by Rowe Brothers and was opened about the first Sunday in November, 1893. Rev. ... Husband was pastor at that time and it was a great day of rejoicing for the people of the district and all who were interested.

An interesting note is further received from the records of the date of December 23rd, 1902, when the church was announced to be free of debt. The following resolution, moved by Bro. Wm. ing which will deal with the old debt, their deep gratitude to Almighty God for the help received from Him during these nine years past. The debt was a heavy burden on the congregation and we feel sure that it was only by the help of God that we were able to pay it. We trust that the same Divine favour and blessing will rest upon the work of our church in the years to come, that neither we nor our children forget that "Except the Lord build a house they labour in vain that build it." Pastor Ferguson was requested to read this resolution to the congregation at the following Tuesday night's meeting.

Another interesting item is that on May 20th, 1907, a pulpit Bible was presented to the church by Mrs. Love, sr. for which a vote of thanks was kindly tendered. Needless to say this Bible is now beyond pulpit use after many years of constant service.

In 1911 the church was the recipient of a sum of money from the estate of the late Henry Abbott, who kindly remembered the church in his will. A letter of condolence and thanks was sent to the executors of the estate for Mr. Abbott's kind remembrance of the church.

During Mr. McCarten's ministry the Berkeley Church was re-shingled and the interior decorated. A new floor was laid in the basement and a new shed 50x50 feet with concrete walls was built. It was late in the fall when the work on the shed as commenced but, with the help of the community, it was completed before winter set in.

In 1914 the church members decided to do something about the cemetery at the south side of the church and accordingly a cemetery board was appointed with Thos. Wiggins as secretary-treasurer and Joseph Black and G. J. McNeely as members. Mr. Wiggins held his position and worked faithfully for the cemetery ever since until the past year when he relinquished the position of secretary-treasurer in favour of Mr. Bert Watts. Mr. Wiggins is still a member of this committee and is to be congratulated for his faithfulness to the cemetery board of the church for the past twenty-eight years. The present committee plan to keep up the tradition of their predecessors and make the cemeteries, former Presbyterian and Methodist, places worthy of our forefathers and loved ones. Since church union the Presbyterian cemetery has come under the supervision of this board.

Since church union, when members of Cooke's Presbyterian church in Berkeley united with the Methodist church, the name was changed to Berkeley United Church and much has been accomplished in the district by the united efforts of both congregations. The traditions of both sides of the church have been so defined that amalgamation means only the carrying out of former principles, and when one looks back over the years and reviews the sacrifices paid by individual members of the churches, we realize that their main object was to preach the gospel and win men and women to the Lord Jesus Christ so that lives might be saved from destruction and souls saved for Eternity.

Just here let us bow in silent prayer for a moment in honour of those who have passed away during the last fifty years from the membership of these churches and their many friends also who, through their interest and prayers have done so much to make His work a success in our midst. May we who are left behind be found worthy to follow in their train.

NATIONAL SELECTIVE SERVICE

Extension of Compulsory Employment Transfers.

To Employers and Employees:

THE 6th Compulsory Employment Transfer Order, issued under authority of National Selective Service Civilian Regulations, requires compliance not later than September 8th, 1943. After that date no employer may continue to employ any man covered by this Order, unless under special permit.

The first five Compulsory Transfer Orders listed occupations, and required compliance by all male employees in those occupations if (a) in an age and marital class designated under the Military Call-up, or if (b) 16, 17 or 18 years of age. The Sixth Order repeats all occupations given in the five earlier Orders, and requires all other men from 16 to 40 years of age (both ages inclusive) to become available for transfer to higher priority jobs, by registering at the nearest Employment and Selective Service Office.

Details of the Sixth Order were advertised in daily newspapers at the end of August. Copies of the Order may be secured from any Employment and Selective Service Office.

If in doubt as to the coverage of this Order, or the procedure under it, ask your nearest Employment and Selective Service Office.

All men, married or single, employed in designated occupations, aged 16 to 40, are now covered by the Orders. To avoid penalties, those who have not yet registered must do so by September 8th, 1943.
