RATION NEWS

The Local Ration Board wishes to thank all the volunteer workers who helped distribute ration book No. 3 in each of the three distributing centres—Markdale, Fiesherston and Dundalk. It was because of the splendid work done by each of the volunteer helpers that the recent distribution was such a success. A total of 3706 books were distributed in the territory under the Local Ration Board. Of this number Markdale issued 1445, Fiesherston 2329 and Dundalk 2902.

Farmers may obtain extra coupons for all the ration foods if they have extra hired men but they must have served at least 12 extra meals to such help. The application forms may be obtained from any of the local representatives of the Board. When these forms are properly filled in and signed, mail them to the Secretary at Fiesherston.

All farmer operators of beef rings must collect the necessary meat coupons from each member of the local ration board at the time he delivers the meat. Coupons must be detached regularly from the ration books at the rate of one coupon for each two pounds of meat delivered, but only one-half the valid number of coupons for each month to be removed from each of the books. This will enable the holder of the book to purchase a variety of meats. At the end of each month the operator of the beef ring must mail all coupons collected to the Secretary of the Local Ration Board.

The increase in the ration allowance for tea and coffee, effective Sept. 2nd, does not mean an increase in the value of such coupon but that more coupons become due each month—that is, two coupons will become good every three weeks instead of every four weeks.

There is no expiry date on the D coupons for jams, etc. They are similar to the sugar and tea and coffee coupons, valid until declared invalid. If you do not wish to purchase jams, canned fruits, honey or syrups with your D coupons, you may purchase 1/2 lb. of sugar with each coupon. But if you are not able to get the exact coupon value when purchasing jams, honey or syrups in containers, you cannot take the difference in a few ounces of sugar. You will simply lose the difference.

One sugar coupon No. 14 and one jam coupon D1 became valid on Sept. 2nd. Sugar coupons Nos. 14 and 14 are now valid. On Sept. 16th sugar coupons D2 and D3 will become valid every four weeks. But meat coupons 26 and 27 are now valid. Meat coupons Nos. 16 become valid on Sept. 9th.

All canned sugar coupons are now valid and will remain valid until declared otherwise by the Ration Administration. The instructions making them invalid after Sept. 30 have been cancelled.
