Pastryless Pies

There's no reason in the world why your family should not enjoy delicious pies for dessert, despite the scarcity of rationed butter and other shortening Here's a pie crust that requires no shortening of any kind — a tender, delicious pie crust that comes ready-made straight out of a cardboard package—no flour no rolling, no fuss whatever.

Pour back into double boiler and heat until it begins to thicken stirring constantly. After it thickens smoothly, cover and cook for 10 minutes. Stir occasionally

% cup milk or cream Combine salt, mustard and sugar in top of double boiler. Beat sggs slightly, add milk and vinegar, and pour into first mixture, stirring constantly. Place over boiling water and cook, stirring frequently, till mixture thickens. Meantime, soften gelatine in cold water, then dissolve in hot mixture; beat smooth. Add flaked salmon. Turn into greased individual moulds or into one large greased mould (loaf pan or casserole). Unmould on crisp lettuce and serve cold.

dyas earlier than in 1942. Officials said Christmas mailings overseas last year amounted to 8,500,000 pounds compared with 5.500,000 pounds in the previous year. This year, with more Canadian servicemen and women overseas, they anticipate a total mail load of about 10,000,000 pounds. "We are suggesting that Canadians planning to get Christmas mail to their friends overseas get

started as soon as possible," one official said "It is far better that a parcel be mailed in September or October with the assurance that it will be delivered in time - barring accidents beyond any control than that the men overseas should be disappointed at Christmas by not receiving the expected gifts from home."


