# RATION NEWS

The representatives on the Local Ration Board at Markdale and Dundalk, as well as the secretary at Flesherton, now have the following forms: Application forms for coupons for extra help on farms; applications for ration books for infants; applications for ration books by persons who have not had a ration book, such as a discharged member of the Armed Forces or a person not previously resident in Canada; applications for replacement of loss ration books; application forms to secure permission to purchase ammunition.

When filling in the Transient La bor forms, be sure to include your name and address; also distinctly state the number of men and num ber of days for each occupation.

All canning sugar coupons are now valid and will remain valid until declared otherwise. Sugar coupons 1 to 18 are valid.

Tea and coffee coupons 1 to 19 are valid.

Preserves coupons D1, D2, D3, D4

and D5 are valid. Butter coupons 28 to 33 are valid Nos. 34 and 35 become valid on Oct 28th. Nos. 28 to 33 will expire o October 31st.

Meat coupons Nos. 17 to 22 are valid. Nos. 17 to 21 will expire on
