For the second time Markdale has headed Grey County in the sale of Victory Loan bonds. This time the average per person in the village is \$149.32. The next in line is Fiesherton with an average of \$130.50 and Hanover with \$118.32. None of the other municipalities reached \$100.00 per head. The local salesman, Mr. A. A. Gillespie, hardly knows how it was done but he accomplished what looked like the impossible. Markdale people are in earnest in their efforts to promote an all-out effort and their record proves this. Some citizens went so far as to sell their cars and invested the money in Canada's war effort. Besides the total of \$115050, another \$11000 was converted which might have been included to bring the total to \$126050 or an average of \$163.70.
