

50th Anniversary for C.P.R.'s Famed Chateau Frontenac



TOWERING up from the most outstanding location in Quebec on the cliff which overlooks the St. Louis Ming in 1908-02 and the Lawrence River, the Chateau Frontenac, one of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company's country-wide chain of "grand hotels", celebrates its 50th anniversary on December 17, 1943. Built on the spot where once rose the Chateau St. Louis, official residence of early French governors and in a city where see lanes and rail lines converge, the great hotel is one of the best known in the world.
