Dear Mary and Thomas,

RATION NEWS

The maximum amount of sugar allowed for home canning will be 10 pounds per person. It will be made available through the use of the first 10 F coupons in Book 3, with each coupon worth 1 pound of sugar. According to present arrangements F coupons 1 to 5 will become valid on May 25th. The remaining 5 F coupons will become valid on July 6th. The expiry date of coupons F1 to F10 is December 31st, 1944. Consumers who are unable to do home canning may exchange one F canning sugar coupon for one Preserves D coupon. But preserves coupons may not be exchanged for F canning sugar coupons. D coupons are good for 1/2-lb. of sugar and F coupons are worth 1 lb. The sugar obtained by use of D coupons may, of course, be used for canning purposes.

It has been announced that from February 3rd, and until May 31st, the value of D coupons for maple syrup will be 40 fluid ounces (1 quart). Four coupons will purchase one gallon of maple syrup. On and after June 1st the coupon value will be reduced to 24 fluid ounces. D coupon No. 16, scheduled to fall due on March 30th, will be made valid on March 2nd. D coupons Nos. 14 and 15 also become valid on March 2nd.

For those who purchase maple syrup by mail, special purchase vouchers will be issued by Local Ration Boards. One purchase voucher will be issued for every 4 valid D coupons and will be good for one Imperial gallon of maple syrup until May 31st.

On January 27th the last of the Tea and Coffee Coupons, Nos. 28 and 29 in Book 3, became valid. E coupons Nos. 1 to 6 will be used for the purchase of tea and coffee. Coupons E1 and E2 for the purchase of tea and coffee will become valid on Feb. 17th.

Coupons now valid are: Sugar, Nos. 14 to 26; Tea and Coffee, Nos. 14 to 29; Preserves D1 to D13; Butter, 46 to 49; Meat 35 to 38.
