

When Bishop West arrived to preside at the conference next day he outlined for the Burmese. British and minority representatives the same ideas he had expressed in his hotel room the previous night. It had telling effect. Within twenty-four hours the Burmese leader and the minority leader had changed their attitude about each other, each admitting the other was "not the hard nut he used to be."

Discussion over details continued for the next four days. Meanwhile the members of the minority delegation who were hopelessly divided, forged among themselves a unity of purpes and policy. They agreed to make no demands. The Government, bowled over by this turn-about-face, decided to give everything the minority group had first wanted. On the final day the following official community considers itself to be a people of Burma and desires to continue as such. As a token of their trust in the good faith of the Burmese people and their desire for a closer association with them, these members have agreed unanimously to recommend to the members of their community the abandonment of all claims to special privileges. The Burmese members of the conference have in their turn given assurances that the Burmese would reciprocate this spirit of generosity and trust, and that they foresee no difficulty in making satisfactory provisions to preserve to the minority community freedom to worship and to teach its own habits and customs, and freedom and facilities to maintain its home language."
