## IN DAYS OF YORE

**60 YEARS AGO**—September 25, 1884  
Markdale was not yet incorporated. Traveston—Cliff and son are doing an extensive business in the woollen mill. P. MacRae opened a conveyancing office and money loan agency in Dunlop's building adjoining McAlear's Hotel.

The County of Grey was well represented at the Toronto Exhibition. Mr. R. J. Trimble had four horses there, three taking prizes. Mr. Angus Paves carried off first prize for the best pair of ponies in harness. Mr. James Myles, a farmer near Kimberley, obtained first for a yearling colt.

The steam saw-mill on the 11th line, Euphrasia, changed hands and is now owned by Mr. J. H. Ford of St. Vincent and Mr. James Stinson of this place. They have their new mill in full blast and are cutting from eight to ten thousand feet per day.

Mr. W. Konold, music teacher, visited the village with the view to forming classes.

Eggs 18 cents per dozen. Butter 18 cents per lb.  
Misses Jennie and Millie Lyons and Mary E. Benson left Markdale last week for Tara where they will carry on a millinery and dressmaking business.

What about a town hall? The question was asked 60 years ago and continues in part. "A joint stock company is perhaps the best means of securing the desired, and much needed object. We will take ten shares of \$10 each, and we have no doubt that a sufficient amount would be readily subscribed, should an opportunity be offered."

**50 YEARS AGO**—September 27, 1894

Gate receipts of Glenelg Agricultural Exhibition held in Markdale exceeded former years. Exhibits were exceptionally fine except in cattle, sheep and pigs, where the prizes seemed insufficient for the trouble involved. Taking part in the concert were Prof. Baker of Toronto, Miss McKenna and Miss McFarland of Markdale and the Citizens' Band under Prof. Galvin.

At the sixth annual fall fair of Walters Falls the new two-story hall and grand stand combined was a decided improvement.

Beaverdale—Mr. Martin has purchased the prairie farm opposite ex-mayor Wright's.

**40 YEARS AGO**—September 29, 1904

The Archbishop of Canterbury visited Markdale.

"Minnis" gang was erecting poles to the new electric power head at Hayward's Falls.

Mrs. G. M. Haskett presented the Markdale school with a collection of native wild plants fully mounted and classified.

Mrs. Kate Sproule announced her Millinery Opening.

Concert by the famous Canadian Jubilee Singers, a coloured company of nine artists, was announced to be held in Marsh's hall.

Classes in Physical Culture were announced to commence in Ennis' hall.

Bowers' Orchestra, which included Messrs. R. Bowers, W. S. Perkins, Geo. Bowers, C. Crowe, J. Bowler, and Clare Treilford, were at Williamsford where they played for a millinery opening.

The family of Geo. Richards left for the West to join Mr. Richards and two sons who had gone to Brandon, Man., two months previous. Mr. Richards, a builder and contractor by trade, had built some of Markdale's finest buildings.

Mr. Frank Maidment, section foreman on C.P.R., returned with his family from a trip to the West.

**30 YEARS AGO**—September 30, 1914

Mr. Joseph Buchanan of Artemesia harvested this season eight tons of onions from three quarters of an acre which at market value brings \$320.

At the "World's Fair", Rocklyn, was to be competition for a prize of \$25.00 for one pound print of butter.

In a letter from the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario to W. J. Shortill, Clerk of the Village, it was estimated power delivered from Eugenia Falls would cost \$23.24 per H.P.

Rapid progress was being made on the Carnegie Library.

## THE MIXING BOWL

Mrs. J. H. suggests: a delicious Tomato Juice Cocktail.

18 ripe tomatoes, 1 cup chopped celery, ½ cup chopped onions, 3 sweet green peppers, 1 sweet red pepper, 2 tablespoons salt, 2 tablespoons vinegar, ¼ cup sugar.

Wash and cut tomatoes. Chop the peppers finely. Mix tomatoes, celery, onions, peppers, and salt together. Boil for one-half hour in a covered kettle. Strain through a coarse sieve. Add vinegar and sugar. Boil 3 minutes, covered. Seal in sterilized jars.

Mrs. J. C. suggests: Chili Sauce.

30 large ripe tomatoes, 4 green peppers, 10 medium-sized onions, 6 large apples, 3 cups vinegar, 4 tablespoons salt, 1 cup white or brown sugar, 1 teaspoon cloves, 1 teaspoon cinnamon.

Wash and peel tomatoes and onions; peel and core apples; remove seeds from peppers. Cut tomatoes and chop onions, apples and peppers. Add vinegar, salt, sugar, and spices and boil for 2 hours. Stir frequently. Seal in sterilized jars.

## STUFFED TOMATO SALAD

6 medium sized tomatoes, ½ cup of peas (green, cooked), ¼ cup of chopped celery, ¼ cup of diced cucumber, salad dressing.

Scald and peel the tomatoes. Cut a slice from the top and hollow out with a spoon. Mix the tomato pulp and salad dressing with the peas, chopped celery and cucumber and fill the tomatoes with this mixture. Lay the slice of tomato on top and garnish with hard-cooked egg yolks forced through a coarse sieve.

## FRIED GREEN TOMATOES

Slice unripe tomatoes in ½ inch slices crosswise. Do not peel. Dip in egg, then in bread crumbs, and saute in bacon fat until nicely browned. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Serve at once.
