Alvin S. Baines Killed By Tractor On Tuesday

Alvin Samuel Baines, aged 40 years, was instantly killed Tuesday morning when the tractor which he was preparing to drive turned over on him For 22 years he had been sailing on the Great Lakes but was home on sick leave for a few weeks and had purchased a tractor and was getting ready to do some plowing on his farm in Bentinck about a mile south of Dornoch when the accident happened. The spark of life had fled when help arrived to release him.

The death of Sir William Mulock, Chancellor of the University of Toronto and retired Chief Justice of Ontario, on Oct. Ist, 1944, ended a brilliant career.

Son of a country doctor and born at Bondhead Sir William studied law. He entered Parliament in 1882, representing North York, and for his services in the Laurier cabinet, was knighted in 1902. In 1896 he was appointed Postmaster General when he established a three-cent postage rate for the British Empire.

Citizens of this district have a personal regard for Sir William since he established some years ago, a fishing reserve on the backline west of Mark-dale where he has spent week-end holidays. This property is still in his name and much of it has been reforested with pines.

With his passing, Canadians everywher mourn the loss of a distinguished Canadian citizen.
