Rotarians Heard of Alaska Highway Building

Mr. Lance Rumbel of Toronto, the one Canadian who was active in the work of the construction of the Alaska Highway, was the guest speaker at the Rotary meeting held on Friday evening last and he gave one of the most interesting talks heard yet by the Club members.

Mr. Rumbel was raised at Hillsdale in Simcoe County, where his father operated a flour mill. As a young man he served in the Great War as a private. Some time after returning to Canada in 1919 he entered the employ of General Motors and advanced until he directed the department selling trucks. His work was outstanding and when the United States government filled the position of general adviser for the building of the Alaska Highway Mr. Rumbel was the man put in charge.

The road was paid for entirely by the United States and served to assure the people of the North American continent that the Japanese would never be allowed to invade from the Alaska territory. Mr. Rumbel told of the obstacles, apparently unsurmountable, being eliminated one by one, until the highway, hard surfaced and usable twelve months in the year, was completed in a short time. Besides the work on the road an oil field was developed and a refinery established in the far north whereby gasoline was reduced from \$3.50 per gallon to 28% cents. The speaker told interestingly of the work in its, various stages and was not boastful in so doing.

In a timely address Major Harris, who recently returned from France, reviewed the progress of the war from September 1939 to the present time, and noted that in that time the enemy had never twould. He attributed the Allies' success when hope seemed low, to the cause of right for which we were fighting. He said that we must see to it that those who have suffered be looked after or rewarded as they require. In conclusion Major Harris reminded his listeners to remember the principles for which these boys died and see that they are forever maintained in this country.
