The egg supply, at present, is becoming scarcer on all markets and we expect to see much higher egg prices.

There is a good demand for the top grades of poultry particularly for export. There is no market for the C grade as yet. We suggest that you make sure that your poultry is well finished before marketing them to assure the top market prices. Poultry which is moulting should be kept until the new feathers come in because too many pin feathers in the birds places them in the C grade class.

Engineers designed the mouth-piece of your telephone to give best results at one-quarter of an inch from the lips. When your lips are further away than this, your voice is transmitted less strongly... less clearly.

Help avoid needless service check-ups, and at the same time let those you talk to hear you without strain. Just remember: Talk clearly, normally, directly into the telephone, with your lips just one-quarter of an inch from the mouth-piece.



Smoking while you talk may cause irritation of the throat. It also prevents you from hearing the mouth-piece directly in front of the lips.

For clear, noise-free transmission, always keep your mouth-piece in front of and close to the lips. Don't "talk across" it.
