Minister of Defence To Run In North Grey

Gen. A. G. L. McNaughton, Minister of National Defence, has accepted the invitation of the North Grey Liberal Association to be their candidate in a by-election to be held early in the New Year to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of William P. Telford, who has represented the riding in the House of Commons since 1935, and which was forwarded to the Speaker at Ottawa a few days ago.

Announcement that Mr. McNaughton would be the Liberal nominee came from John Dolphin, president of the association, to whom the telegram was addressed.

Mr. Telford was elected Liberal member of the House of Commons in 1926, 1935 and again in 1940.

It is expected a meeting of the association will be held next Saturday to nominate Mr. McNaughton.

The writ for the holding of the by-election was issued at Ottawa on Monday. December 11th, and A. E. Moore, who is the permanent Returning Officer for the riding, has received his instructions to proceed with the holding of the election. He has accordingly issued his proclamation naming Monday, January 29, from noon until 2 o'clock in the afternoon for receiving the nomination of candidates, and polling day has been set one week 2 o'clock in the atternoon for receiving the nomination of candidates, and polling day has been set one week later, Monday, February 5th, with the polls being open from 8 o'clock in the morning until 6 o'clock in the evening.

Mayor Case Will Oppose Gen. McNaughton

Garfield Case as their candidate, who accepted the responsibility.
