In an exciting game here on Friday night last, Markdale staged a last minute rally to win from Shelburne by a single goal. There was little to choose between the two teams throughout, and it was anybody's game until the winning goal was scored with less than a minute of play remaining.

The locals were most effective in the first period and skated off with a 3-1 lead. Markdale marksmen were Falls, Madden and McTaggart, while Shelburne's lone counter was scored by Paget. Things looked different in the second period when Stoddard and Laybourne counted for Shelburne to even up the score only to have Wiley put the locals in the lead again when he took a pass from A. Fitzsimmons and made no mistake on his shot.

Shelburne tied the score early in the third period when Watson fooled Banks completely, and from then on it was fast and furious with both goals being called on repeatedly. With less than a minute to go Angus-Fitzsimmons grabbed the puck at his own defence and after a rink-length rush scored the winning counter. Garfield Case Elected Wins By 1,239 Votes

W. Garfield Case, Progressive Conservative, was elected as member of the House of Commons for North Grey in Monday's by-election when he defeated Hon. A. G. L. McNaughton, Minister of National Defence of the Mackenzie King government. Mr. Case's majority over General McNaughton was 1,239, and 4,202 over Air Vice-Marshal Earl Godfrey, C.C.F. candidate. Mr. Case is the first Progressive Conservative to defeat a cabinet minister since the beginning of the war, and his victory was an outstanding one in that respect.

The former Mayor of Owen Sound proved to be an exceptionally strong candidate. This was evidenced by the results, as he was the winner in every municipality in the riding with the exception of Sydenham township, which is traditionally strongly Liberal, and maintained that record in Monday's voting.

The campaign, while bitterly fought from every platform throughout the riding, was fairly clean as political campaigns go, although in the closing days there were some heated remarks from the lips of some of the speakers which are likely forgotten by this time.

The campaign in North Grey became widespread as it progressed, and during the past two weeks it might be fairly stated that the eyes of the entire country were focussed on North Grey.

When voting day came on Monday things were at a high pitch. The weather was ideal for an election taking into consideration the fact that the election was held in the winter time, with the country roads not in any too good shape, and the result was that the total vote polled was slightly more than 70 per cent which was a little larger than in the general election of 1940.

Agricultural Society Report Shows Successful Year

The annual meeting of Markdale Agricultural Society was held in the Department of Agriculture on Saturday afternoon last with a fair attendance of members present.

President F. D. Sawyer, in his opening remarks, expressed thanks to the officers and members of the Fair Board, and all who helped by their support and interest to make the 1944 show a success.

The treasurer's report showed receipts of \$1493.59; expenditures of \$1151.54, and a balance of \$341.95 on hand after all prizes and accounts were paid in full, no deductions of any kind having been made.

The dates selected for the 1945 Fair were Wednesday and Thursday, October 3 and 4, and there was considerable discussion on ways and means of making it better and more interesting than in previous years.

It was decided to ask the Dept. of Agriculture to conduct a short course during February or early March. The topics suggested were: Hydro Installation, Soils and Fertilizers, Pastures, Markets.

Rev. John Crook Told of China Missions

The illustrated talk by Rev. John Crook on his work under the China Inland Mission, given in Cooke's Church on Tuesday evening, told of the speaker's work and experiences among the Chinese. He found travelling to China in 1936 which required but three weeks, very different from his return last year which was made in three months. The party of three including his wife and baby, were allowed but thirty-five pounds of baggage, but they could weigh 200 pounds, which necessitated the wearing of all excess clothing.

Rev. Crook, who speaks the Chinese language fluently declared he required from three to four years to learn it. One must be acquainted with the habits and ways of the people which he said were no stranger to them than some of ours were to the Chinese. He spoke of the inflation existing in China since the outbreak of war and prices paid for articles were in striking contrast to the prices which formerly existed.

The slides shown were most interesting, depicting the strange dress and customs of these people. The boats, punks, perhaps so-called from their frailness, the bamboo rafts, and boats that families actually lived their lives on were shown. Among other scenes shown was a Chinese barber who also did duty as a chiropractor, the children which were ill-fed and ill-clad and the Chinese general way of life. The unsanitary condition of food makes it necessary to consume all food when hot in order to avoid disease.

Pictures also showed the results of ruthless Japanese bombing of hospitals and homes and the fleeing of refugees. The bombings revealed some of the awful idols worshipped by these unbelievers, who, the speaker asserted, were afraid of the evil spirits that were connected with them. Their whole belief is one of superstition and idolatry. Of much interest was the mission, conducted by Rev. John Crook, and the number of followers was evidence of the welcome these people give to missionaries who go there to help and enlighten them. In conclusion the speaker urged his hearers to pray for the people of China in these suffering days. The pictures demonstrated clearly the need for Christian people to help promote mission work in these foreign lands. The speaker was introduced by Mr. Keyes of Fiesherston who had been with Rev. Crook at Bible College and was thanked by chairman, Hillis Burnside. Other numbers on the program were a solo by Miss Betty Down; a reading by Mrs. Emerson McCullough; a duet by Mrs. Howard Dennison and Mrs. J. Colgan and the singing of hymns. Visiting clergy assisted with the worship service.

Mrs. M. Henry was appointed secretary-treasurer in place of M. Henry, who had resigned to become reeve of the village.

The inspector's report on the whole was a good one and suggested that the work of interior and exterior decorating begun by the board could be completed next year.

Inspector Durrant suggested that the lighting was only fair, that extra science equipment was needed and that the English and science departments needed supplies.

In commenting on the operation of the school, the inspector submitted a very favourable report. Standards of the school are high and the discipline throughout is good.

Through her efforts peace and comfort were exchanged for sickness and trouble in many Toronto homes. Many families there owe her unrepayable debts.

Out of town relatives were present from Toronto and Owen Sound. She leaves to mourn her loss, her partner, Jos. Buchanan; three brothers, Wm. R. of Ravenna, George of Vandeleur, Albert of Toronto; one niece and five nephews. Her mother predeceased her six years ago. A brother, Charlie, sacrificed his life in the First World War.
