Fatal Accident Takes Life Of 4-Year-Old Sandy Ward

Seldom has this community been so hocked and so moved to sympathy as when it became known that Sanford Ward, four-year-old son of Pte. and Mrs. Eldrid Ward had died as a result of an unfortunate accident at his home on the highway north of Markdale on Thursday afternoon, February 22nd.

The little lad was out playing a usual on Thursday afternoon, and with his shovel he had climbed up on top of the lean-to woodshed at the back of the house. Sandy had opened the door at two o'clock to ask the time and had returned to his play. Unknown to his mother, who was baking at the time, he had gone up on the roof where a ladder had been placed in case of fire. Some time later his mother went to look for him and found his body suspended from the roof. The frantic mother worked trying to revive him. Several times during that time she had tried to summon help as cars passed on the highway. At last she rushed to a neighbours, Russell McCarm's, and sent for Dr. Carefoot who stated death had been almost instant.

The boy's father has been overse three and a half years, his son being nine months old when he left . Since that time he has been tenderly cared for by his mother, who though severely handicapped by lack of speech give him every chance. Sandy was a bright and loving little fellow whom everybody liked and a good companion for his mother, and his sudden passing is keenly felt. The sympathy of the entire district is extended to his parents in their tragic sorrow.

The funeral held on Saturday from Oliver's Funeral Chapel was largely attended by sympathizing friends. The service was in charge of Mr. Paul Rumball, minister of Cooke's Church, who based his remarks on the important place children filled in the life of Christ. Assisting was Rev. C. J.
