Eighth Victory Loan Off To A Good Start

In recognition of twenty-five years of service in Grey County, as head of the Department of Agriculture with headquarters in Markdale, Mr. T. S. Cooper was presented with a gitt of a Waterman's pen and pencil set in leather case, by members of the 1945 County Council at their recent session. During his term of office Mr. Cooper's work throughout the County has been outstanding, and he has taken a very active part in promoting better farming conditions in the community.

the past seven loans, which have covered a period of three and a half years. The total was \$26,055,000, which brings an arnual yield in interest of \$781,650. This means that the people of Grey County and its various institutions are receiving more than three quarters of a million dollars annually in interest on the Victory Bonds alone. If this interest money were invested again in Bonds it would go a long way to help reach that objective of four and a half million dollars.

During the past seven loans Markdale has bought a total of \$831,000 in Victory Bonds and the interest annually on these amounts to \$20,430. Euphrasia has bought well over half a million in Victory Bonds—\$534,000 to be exact—and the Euphrasia people are collecting \$16,020 annually in interest. Glenelg purchases have been \$286,000, with interest amounting to \$8,040 annually.
