The following air mail letter has been received by Mrs. Shaw, teacher at Wodehouse school from Pte. Eric L. K. Clark. Eric's parcel, for which he sends his thanks, was one of four sent overseas to local boys in January by the teacher and pupils of Wodehouse Public School.

Dear Mrs. Shaw,  
Many thanks for the parcel which I received yesterday. I am most grateful for the same and appreciate the kindness of the students very much. Please express to them my thanks and tell them I shared the contents with my friends here and enjoyed it to the full.

I am very well but very busy and for the last three weeks we have been inoculating the unit for diphtheria. Some prove immune to the test but most did not. The boys say they have had so many needles that they will look like a pin cushion. Ha! Ha! I received a letter from Beverly some time ago. Please tell him I will write him directly.

All my people here are fairly well, considering conditions. You know there is very little to write about, but the weather is grand now and the country looks swell. Well, the news is encouraging, and pray God the end of strife is not far off. At least, we hope not anyway.

We all had a good laugh over the Valentine card for which I also thank you. To-day is my letter-writing day, and I am away behind so I must get down to business. Well, I must close now. So, thanking you all again, with kindest regards to all the friends, I am,

Writing letters is another way boys and girls remember their soldier friends. Each family represented at school, chooses a relative or friend in the Armed Forces. Once every two weeks, the school children write to a soldier, whose turn it happens to be. The letter which follows is an answer to one of these received from John Hutchinson.

Dear Teacher and Pupils,  
Received your most welcome letter, or should I say group of letters, just the other day. I sure was glad to learn that everyone was fine when you wrote. But for my part, I am sorry to say that I have been in the hospital with mumps. Of course I didn't feel sick or anything but being as mumps are contagious, they sent me to a quarantined ward for two weeks. These last few days I have been able to get a pass and go for a walk down town. Of course, like most English towns, they have several cinemas or, as we would say, picture shows, also a Y.M.C.A. and Canadian Legion Hut. They consist of a writing and reading room, lunch counter, etc.

The trip across was swell; the water was reasonably calm, and, of course, that helped a lot, but we didn't see any icebergs or whales. I guess they are more plentiful along the East coast and farther north.

Some of you wanted to know how the winter was over here. Well, January was wet and cold with the odd skiff of snow, but these last two months have been lovely. The grass is green and the leaves are out. One can go and sit in the park and listen to the birds. It seems more like May to me, instead of March. The farmers were sowing their spring crops a month ago. I only hope you believe me as it makes one wonder, if they didn't actually see it. For what I have seen of England, I like it fine, but, as you know, everyone doesn't think the same.

Well, it's plain to see, I'm not much of a letter writer, so I'll sign off for now, wishing to thank you, one and all, especially for the clipping from the Sun-Times. I knew a Lieut. Cole from Owen Sound and most of the names mentioned.

## Important Notice to Prospective Candidates

● Returning Officers for all Electoral Districts in Ontario are authorized by Paragraph 22 of the Active Service Voting Regulations, 1945, to accept nomination papers of candidates in the pending Ontario General Election at any time after they receive the Writ of Election.

### MAKE SURE OF ACTIVE SERVICE VOTE

In order to be sure of having their names available to Active Service Voters, candidates should file their nomination papers with the Returning Officer for their Electoral District not later than MONDAY, MAY 7th, 1945.

Every effort will be made to make available to Active Service Voters the names of candidates who file their papers after May 7th, but owing to the pressure of the war service in the use of cable and telegraph wires, no assurance can be given that such names will be available for Active Service Voters on polling days.

FILE YOUR NOMINATION PAPERS WITH THE APPROPRIATE RETURNING OFFICER BEFORE MAY 7th, NEXT, and make sure your name will be on the list of candidates supplied for the use of Active Service Voters.
