Coupons now valid are Butter 90 to 106, Sugar 46 to 57, Preserves 33 to 46. The first "P" coupon good for the purchase of preserves or canning sugar will become valid on June 21st, accord will become valid on June 21st, according to an announcement by WPTB. The announcement has been made to allay fears of the housewife that sufficient coupons would not be forthcoming. Each orange preserves coupon and each yellow "P" coupon is good for one-half pound of sugar or the regular preserves ration. This year consumers are allowed 10 pounds additional sugar for canning purposes.
