Every Grey County Centre "Over The Top"

Despite the lagging till the last week the Eighth Victory Loan was an outstanding success in the Dominion and in each province, town and village. With an objective of \$1.350,000,000, that huge amount has been oversubscribed by Canadians by nearly 39 millions.

In Grey County, every municipality attained its objective, and individual investors are to be commended for this achievement. Flesherton stands first in the county being the first municipality to attain its quota of \$40,000. It did look for awhile as if Markdale would not make the grade, but a quick spurt the final week of the drive, put this central Grey County village "over the top" with its quota of \$100,000 exceeded by \$16,000, or 116%. Holland township goal of \$70,000 was exceeded by \$27,450, while Glenely bought bonds totalling \$56,700, exceeding their allotment by \$1700.

Coming as it does in the hour of the victory in Europe, news of the success of this loan will be received with much interest overseas.

Capt. Bugler Tells Rotary Club About Scouting

Club About Scouting

The Markdale Rotary Club had as guest speaker at their meeting last Tuesday, the new rector of Christ Church, Capt. The Reverend W. G. Bugler. The speaker had been invited to speak to the club about Scouting with a view to securing sponsorship for a Scout Troop in Markdale. He cutlined the aims, policy and general organization of the Scout Movement. He told how soouting can be of the greatest assistance to character building in boys and how it has already done so in many parts of the world. It is a world-wide movement, as big a hing as Rotary. It is non-secterian. The boys are taught spiritual values, such as truth, honesty, courtesy and helpfulness to others without any attempt to relate it to any denominational outlock. The boys are rever urged to go to any other church than their own. They are really taught practical Christianity dressed up in the things bors love, the great outdoors.

The Cubs' program is based on stories of the jungle. Akela, the big wolf (the Cubmaster) is obeyed by his Wolf Cubs. Well do our best," is their motto. Wolf Cubs are boys 8 to 12 years of age. Scouts have as their program the lore of the forest trail, the lore of woodcraft and camping. They learn to be self-reliant in the great outdoor world and to be ready in any emergency to help those needing shelp. "Be Prepared" is their motto. A King's Scout, a boy of the highest standing in scouting is a very efficient and capable lad indeed. He has to be to reach King Scout standard. Scouts are from 12 to 18 years of age. Boys over 18 who continue in Scouting are formed into a Rover Crew. In the Crew they learn to be Scoutmasters and the thing would be the moral support of the club for Scouting. He, himself, would be Scoutmaster and would require help of three types. The first would be the problem of securing adequate quarters for the boys for their exclusive use.
