The campaign has been extremely successful, and of the 62 Ontario Units, Grey ended in 5th place. Subscriptions were in excess of \$6,000,000 which is by far the greatest amount of Bönds ever purchased by the people of this County, and amounts to over 1835 of the minimum objective. The number of applications totalled almost 10,700, which is an increase over last Loan of about 500. Every municipality went over the top, and I want to personally thank everyone who helped make the Loan such a great success.
