Progressive Conservative Party Wins 66 Seats

Voters throughout Ontario expressed their faith in the leadership of George Drew in Monday's voting when they gave the Conservative party a sweeping victory over all opposition. As compared with the 33-member minority of August 4, 1943, the Progressive Conservatives won 66 of the 90 seats in the legislature with every cabinet minister re-elected. The Liberals won 11 seats, compared with 15 in the last election while the CCF party lost 28 of their 34 seats. With the soldier vote still to be heard from, it is possible that the Conservative count may exceed the 70 mark.
