Findley McDonald's 5 Year Plan For North Grey

When I accepted the Liberal nomination for the Federal House, I did so in the belief that, as a life-long citizen, who is familiar with the needs of North Grey, I could adequately represent this constituency and try to obtain for it, improvements and aid that would mean much in the development of the district and contribute to the benefit of all its people.

In this respect, I am fully alive to the important projects that should be advanced for the development of the City of Owen Sound. While not a citizen of Owen Sound, I live in Sydenham Township, within six miles of the city. My grandfather settled in our locality over 100 years ago, and since then, our family has made Owen Sound its market and shopping place. I am keenly alive to the aspirations and plans for the future of Owen Sound, as well as Meaford and Thornbury, and when elected shall go out and fight for urban interests with the same aggressiveness as I will use in urging the improvements affecting the townships.

when I am elected, I would aim definitely to accomplish worth-while things for North Grey, and I am listing some of the plans I would endeavour to earry out during the five year term. Every one of these ideas is possible of attainment. This is not a general program that may mean anything or nothing, but is a down-to-earth plan and each one of the ideas is possible of attainment and each would be of real benefit to our citizens. As a matter of fact, the sum of \$174,000 has been already included by the Federal Government in the post war program for Owen Sound (mostly for the Harbour) and other work has been planned for Meaford and Thornbury. I would continue to see that the interests and needs of North Grey were constantly kept before the Government.

HERE IS MY PROGRAM:

- 1. Carry on vigorously, the negotiations started by W. P. Telford and Walter Harris, M.P. for Grey-Bruce, for building an airport-in this district, in connection with the proposed Trans-Canada Air Lines new air route from Toronto to Winnipeg, across the Great Lakes. Government surveys have been made and preliminary plans are being prepared for a huge airport within 12 miles of Owen Sound. The construction of the airport would cost over a million dollars and would be of lasting benefit to this entire district, for it will give us a place directly on a transcontinental air line. This is the most important project for the advancement of the district under consideration to-day, and would have my full support.
- Continue the program of harbour improvements at the Port of Owen Sound, carried on for 19 years under the guidance of the former member, W. P. Telford. The next step is to straighten out that section of the West Side of the harbour north of the C.N.R. shed, known as the Dry Dock property, and construct a modera wharf there. Also, to plan ahead for an up-to-date passenger wharf, where large cruise ships can be adequately decked.
- S. Urge, as part of the post-war program, the construction of a new federal building in Owen Sound to accommodate the offices of new Government departments which have been opened to serve the district. This could take the form of a new building to house all departments or a separate one for the Employment office, Government Annulties branch, Prices and Trade Board office and other departments which will be opened here to serve the Grey and Bruce area.

 4. Request the Postmaster-General for a complete survey of all rural mall routes in North Grey, with a view to developing a more efficient and prompt distribution of mall to residents in the township, by reorganizing existing routes, or if necessary, establish new routes. It is nearly 35 years since the present routes were laid out, and in many townships, conditions have changed.
- Make further harbour improvements at Meaford, that would assure the future of that lake port, and also afford proper, protection and facilities for the large fleet of boats operated by tourist

- Urge the opening up in Owen Sound of a district income tax office where the people of this area could consult officials on their problems and where payments and adjustments could be made.
- 7. Build a new Armouries in Owen Sound, or have the Department of Defence purchase the Curling Rink, now leased as an Armouries and thus enable the Curling Club to finance the construc-tion of a new rink, or return to their old property.
- 8. Urge on the Federal Department of Agriculture, a careful survey and study of North Grey Townships, with a view to recommending special lines of agriculture and fruit growing, which could be successfully carried on in this area and for which our soil and climate are suitable.
- Co-operate with the fruit growers of Thornbury, Clarksburg, and the Beaver Valley in developing new processes and markets for apple crops and furthering the interests of this industry.
- 16. Approach the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation Approach the Canadam Programs come through our district radio station C.F.O.S. At present the "Trans-Canada" programs can be heard at times, only with great difficulty and "Dominion" network programs cannot be heard at all in North
- 11. Have the Post Office Department arrange a Sunday evening outgoing mail service from Owen Sound, either via the C.N.R. Sunday train from Meaford, or by inaugurating a Sunday evening train from Owen Sound over the C.P.R.
- 12. Seek to re-establish three mail collections a day from all street letter boxes in Owen Sound. At present, the system is curtailed and a new collection all over the city should be made each afternoon for mail to go out on the C.P.R. five o'clock
- 13. Co-operate with the city officials of Owen Sound, Meaford and Thornbury, in seeking to establish in these centres, new industries that could be established profitably in this part of Ontario. .
