The soldier vote affected four Federal Ridings, when the Liberal standing was reduced to 118 seats, Progressive Conservative remained at 66 and the C.C.P.'s gained one, raising their total to 28.

In the riding of Prime Albert

In the riding of Prince Albert, where the prime minister had a lead of 263 in last Monday's vote, the soldier vote brought about his defeat by 129 votes by E. L. Bowerman, C.C.P.

The standing of the Grey-Bruce riding was not affected, Harris, who carried the riding receiving 310, John Grierson 307 and Alfred Sachs, C.C.P., 167 votes, making their final standing 3971, 7,653, 1,077, respectively and giv-
