Soldier Vote Alters Standing

The soldier vote affected four Federal Ridings, when the Liberal standing was reduced to 118 seats, Progressive Conservative remained at 66 and the C.C.F.'s gained one, raising their total to 23.

In the riding of Prince Albert, where the prime minister had a lead of 263 in last Monday's vote, the soldier vote brought about his defeat by 129 votes by E. L. Boxerman, C.C.F.

The standing of the Grey-Bruce riding was not affected, Harris, who carried the riding receiving 310, John Grierson 307 and Alfred Sachs, C.C.F., 167 votes, making their final standing 8,971, 7,663, 1,077, respectively and giving Harris a majority of 1308.

In North Grey, Garfield Case received a total of 570 soldier votes, which is almost as much as his three opponents combined. The total vote of Case was 9,204, giving him a majority of 1,638.

Honoured in the King's Birthday List Included in the King's honour list announced recently from Ottawa were four names which have a special interest for Markdale people. They are: Lt. George Shambrooke Dundas, son of Mrs. Ruby Dundas and the late Wm. Dundas of Markdale, and Sgt. Ldr. John Eric Bythell, son of Rev. J. R. Bythell of this place, who received the king's commendation for valuable services in the air. Also "Mentioned in Despatches" was Sgt. Delbert M. Hill, son of Mr. and Mrs. Silas Hill, and Chief Yeoman of Signals, Frederick Harold Ames, uncle of Mrs. (Rev.) W. G. Bugler of this place, who was awarded the British Empire Medal.

Ft. Lt. George Dundas, who is a popular local boy, was one of the four Chatham members of the armed forces who have been honoured for gallantry. George has made rapid progress since his enlistment and this honour which has been won is deserving of hearty commendation.

In the same group of Air Force men appears the name of Sgt. Ldr. John Eric Bythell, also commended "for valuable services in the air." Mr. Bythell has been in Markdale on several occasions and his father, Rev. J. R. Bythell who is now critically ill, was the former rector of Markdale. His wife resides at Campbellford.

Sgt. Delbert Hill, who was born and brought up in this district and attended Barrehead school just west of town, has been decorated with the award, "Mentioned in Despatches," for gallant service while serving with the Canadian Army. Delbert went overseas in August, 1942, and has since been married in England.

Mr. Ames, formerly of London, is a British pensioner and since the outbreak of war has been associated with the Navy at Halifax where he has had "special work" connected with the Atlantic shipping.

On Thursday, June 14th, in Sarnia, Leonard Law Blackburn, formerly of Toronto, beloved husband of Blanche Lucas Macpherson and son of the late George and Ann Blackburn of Alderley Edge, Cheshire, England, passed away.

Mr. Blackburn came to Canada in his early manhood as manufacturer's agent for British textiles and made his headquarters in Toronto. In September of 1914 he was married in Christ Church, Markdale, to Miss Macpherson, only daughter of the late Angus Macpherson, manager of the first chartered bank in Markdale and, for many years, clerk of the municipality. He enlisted and served in France and Flanders throughout the first World War. Returning to Canada he engaged in business activities in Toronto for many years. Some three or four years ago Mr. and Mrs. Blackburn, along with Mrs. Blackburn's mother, Mrs. Macpherson, who made her home with them, moved to Sarnia, where Mr. Blackburn occupied the position of personnel relations officer in the plant of Imperial Oil Ltd.
