Sorry to say that the quality of the eggs, we are now receiving, is not nearly what it should be. There are far too many 'B' grade eggs — placed in this grade on account of heavy yolks. There are several causes of heavy yolks - one

being exposure of eggs to warm temperature — and another - hens being let out while still hungry, filling up on grass and anything else they may find. In order to overcome these obstacles we strongly

urge the producer to follow these suggestions:


1. Avoid letting hens out if possible. If you let them out, feed them well in the forenoon and let them run for a short time, only, in the afternoon. 2. Gather eggs at least twice a day and

place in a wire basket or open-sided container to allow for air circulation.

3. Keep eggs in a cool place.

4. Market at least twice a week.
