Vegetables Scarce; Prices **High On East Coast**

With ration restrictions tightening down we are apt to forget that, tho' we may have to spread our butter a little thinner and take less sugar, we still live in a land of plenty, and should be truly thankful. Visitors here are amazed at our supplies—where we even have a choice—and local store-keepers do well to limit purchases to customers in order to serve the multimate.

We have all read of the acute shortage of Irish spuds but not many of us have suffered from that shortage here, or of other fresh vegetables. The fact that food supplies are limited in Canada to a marked degree is revealed by a description of existing shortages in Hallfax contained in a letter from Mrs. Jas. M. F. Smibert (nee Alice Cutting) where her husband is stationed at present.

The letter written to her aunt, Mrs. Stella Wyvill, says, in part: "We are in rather a bad way down here as it is almost impossible to buy food. Potatoes and carrots are just non-existent. Cannot buy any canned fruit and there is no fresh fruit on the market here. We have all read of the acute sho

here.

I hardly know what we are going to do. There is no shortening to be bought either and lettuce is the only fresh vegetable; occasionally they have cabbage I'm told but the prices are staggering."

Red Cross Clinics To Re-open In August

Continued support of the Blood Donor Service and urgent necessity for donors to continue their faithful attendance at clinics is urged in view

attendance at clinics is urged in view of the fact that Ottawa has announced that there are to be about 35,000 Canadian troops in the Pacific. Blood serum must be made available to the wounded in that theatre of war.

Canadian Red Cross blood donor clinics will re-open next month. Mr. Russell T. Kelley, Chairman of Canadian Red Cross Blood Donor service in Otanrio, emphasizing the need for continued support of the public, pointed out: "While the war with Germany is over, the war with Japan is far from finished. There are two big reasons (including that stated above) why the service must continue. The British Government, and they in turn have requested Canadian Red Cross for 150,000 bottles of blood serum annually until the war is won. To produce that quantity will require 500,000 donations annually in Canada and Ontario has agreed to produce half of that toal on a basis of 5,500 donations weekly.

Markdale can be depended upon to do her part when the need is urgent, and every available donor and particularly men in this district, should keep in mind this call for volunteers, and be ready when the next clinic is announced here.

Meat Stored in Lockers
